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**Lathrup Schedules
One More Pickup
For Yard Waste**

LATHRUP — Oct. 20 has been scheduled for the last collection of yard wastes until next spring, according to a city letter to all residents.

Receipts must be no more than one bushel in capacity. Brush and branches will be collected if they have been cut into lengths not exceeding four feet in length and tied into bundles. Tree limbs exceeding four inches in diameter cannot be collected.

Yard wastes include branches, twigs, shrub clippings, weeds, leaves, grass, general yard and garden waste materials and dirt incidental to planting.

Regular rubbish collection days continue to be the first and third Fridays of each month.
