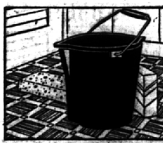

educational activities in camps and recreation agencies.
Many sessions of the Congress were devoted to the problems of those who must plan and manage community recreation facilities and programs.
DONALD J. Pizzimenti, American Personnel Association lecturer and personal specialist for the Detroit Edison Co., told the congress that good people are the key to good performance and outlined techniques of helping staff develop their fullest potential.
The congress was sponsored by the American Recreation Society and the National Recreation Association with the cooperation of the Detroit Department of Parks and Recreation, Recreation Association of Michigan and the Federation of National Professional Organizations for Recreation.
It was announced that the next National Recreation Congress will be held in Philadelphia, Sept. 29-Oct. 5, 1962.

and bear hunters as well as small game nineros.
Favorable conditions are expected to improve shortly as the heavy cover is knocked down by recent frost. Opening day reports point to good hunting in many areas during the weeks ahead.
More ruffed grouse were reported throughout the northern lower peninsula, the central sector of the upper peninsula, and the Keweenaw peninsula. Elsewhere, the bird's population appears about the same as last season.
Sharp-tailed grouse numbers are generally the same or better compared with last year with good flocks noted in north Dickinson county, southern Alger county, and the Seney-Bullcock-Cuano area of the upper peninsula.
Flocks of migrating geese were sighted Oct. 1 in the Crystal Falls and Escanaba districts above the Straits.
