# Groves Fails League Test; Riverside Rolls to 33-0 Win

When Groves rolled over Whitmore Lake Coach Carl Pendrick gave all his boys a chance to play. The Falcons gridders, frustrated by close losses to Seaholm and Cranbrook, exploded for eight touchdowns and their first victory of the year.

"I saw the Dearborn Heston Country Day game. They play Heston there Friday at 4 p.m. When I left at the end of the third quarter, the visiting gridders were well inside the Groves end zone—five points on touchdowns and three more times for extra points. Final score: Riverside 33, Groves 0.

"OUR INJURIES hurt us," said Groves coach Carl Pendrick. "We missed Clark's passing and Moore's running. Substitute quarterback Dick Clark did a commendable job for his lack of experience and three of his passes were intercepted, two for touchdowns.

"OUTSTANDING for Riverside were the quarterback and a tall end named Ral. They worked real well together," he added.

STARTING quarterback Bill Faulds didn't see action. He complained of pain in his abdomen and doctors recommended he not play. Also missing was regular fullback Doug Moore who suffered a shoulder dislocation early in the game. Also missing was any type of offensive threat.

Clarencville could not hold on to the ball and Bloomfield quickly recovered a fumble. Kenner quarterbacked Roger Stewart to take to the air as he connected with O'Neil for a 26-yard touchdown pass.

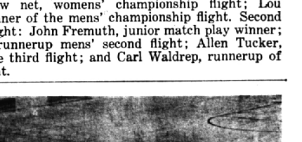
