Growth Requires Split
In Boy Scout District

The largest Boy Scout district in
the United States has been cut in
half.
The division was made necessary
by the rapid population growth in
the Birmingham area and in other
north suburban areas which com-
prised the old District One. The
Woodward Avenue and the ex-
tension of Coolidge Highway is the
dividing line for the two new dis-
tricts.
The Western half of the district
has become the new North Trails
District.
The Eastern half has become the
Northridge District.

BIRMINGHAM lies within the
North Trails District as does
Bloomfield Hills, Southfield, Ber-
keley Woods and Oak Park.
Wing Lake School was the site
of the first annual dinner meeting
of North Trails district Oct. 12.
Master of Cerimonies was Guy
Holloway, 870 Bloomcrest Drive,
Birmingham. District chairman
Thomas Thompson, 735 Ardmore
Drive, Birmingham, introduced his
team of vice chairmen. William
Holdsworth, 831 Ivy Lane, Bir-
mingham, and Robert Morrison,
6275 Surrey East, Birmingham,
and district commissioner James
Buchanan, 940 Henrietta, Bir-
mingham. Holloway is also a vice chair-
man of the new district.

10 years District One grew from
3,000 boys in 88 units to 10,500
boys in 266 units.

The acceptance of scouting and
expected population increase
prompted the Detroit Area Council
to divide the district. The New
North Trails District begins with
4,900 boys in 152 units. With half
the area, it is already numerically
much larger than its predecessor
district was 10 years ago.

JAMES SMITH, representing the
Detroit Area Council in Camping
matters, told the group that the
new North Trails district already
leads all Detroit area districts in
the number of boys enjoying camp-
ing experience through Scouting
and ranks second in the number of
Scout units making camping trips.
Half of North Trails troops at-
tended summer camps compared to
one out of three in Detroit.
Smith said that all of the Detroit
Council's available camping space
will be used up by 1968 and that
the Council is now looking over
1,000-acre parcels within two to
five hours drive of Detroit which
might be purchased by—or donat-
ed to—the Boy Scouts.
He said that a study of where

Troy Seeks 3-Mill
Hike in School Tax

Troy School Board will ask for a
tax increase of three mills for four
years in a special millage election
Nov. 28.
The citizens' committee recom-
mendation for the increase received
unanimous approval at the school
board's Oct. 18 meeting. However,
approval of the millage increase
would not make funds available in
time to offset the current \$300,000 deficit budget.

SUPT. REX B. SMITH said he
would study possible cuts in the
budget and present his recommen-
dations at Tuesday night's board
meeting.

The deficit, according to Smith,
has resulted from a number of mis-
fortunes, the biggest one being a
lower enrollment which caused
about an \$18,000 decrease in antici-
pated revenue.

"When we adopted the budget it
was balanced," said Smith.
"But we planned on getting cer-
tain monies that did not develop.
Now we will have to go through the
budget and cut it a m a we had
planned to buy this year."

"IT IS GOING to be a tough
job," he said. "About 85 per cent
of the budget is teachers' salaries
and we can't cut those. We will
have to find the \$300,000 in the
remaining 15 per cent."

SMITH said the millage increase
would amount to \$2.20 per \$1,000
of assessed valuation. The present tax
rate is about \$28.40 per \$1,000 of
assessed valuation.
Producing about \$120,000 per
year for operating purposes, the
millage increase would be used to
finance past deficits, increase teach-
ers' salaries, improve the curricu-
lum and hire a full-time junior high
school librarian.

TROY'S RECENT precinct re-
stricting will be in effect for the
first time in the special election.
Instead of the former seven pre-
cincts the city now has 11.
