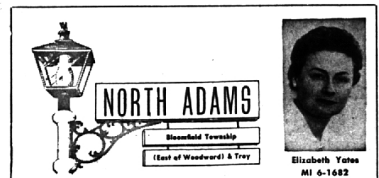

NORTH ADAMS—Milan Sablich had his home on Townhill Drive built to accommodate a growing collection of trophies from his hunting expeditions. Joining him on his recent hunt in September were Dr. L. L. Ludwig of Rochester and a Canadian guide. They flew to the wilds of western Canada where Sablich's kill included a moose, a bear and a wolf. The wolf is presently in the process of becoming a rug, complete with head.

Sablich's party felt fortunate in obtaining their hunting license for this particular hunt as only 40 permits are issued per year in the United States. Their hunt equipment traveled ahead of the party by three months.

Now that the hunt is over, Sablich has his eye on the special species of rams only to be found in the Hawaiian Islands, and a rare species in Tibet and Mongolia. There is also a desert ram in Arizona that he plans to add to his collection. A year ago Sablich returned home with a white ram from his hunt in the Yukon. Two years ago while hunting in Montana he downed a ram, goat and an antelope.

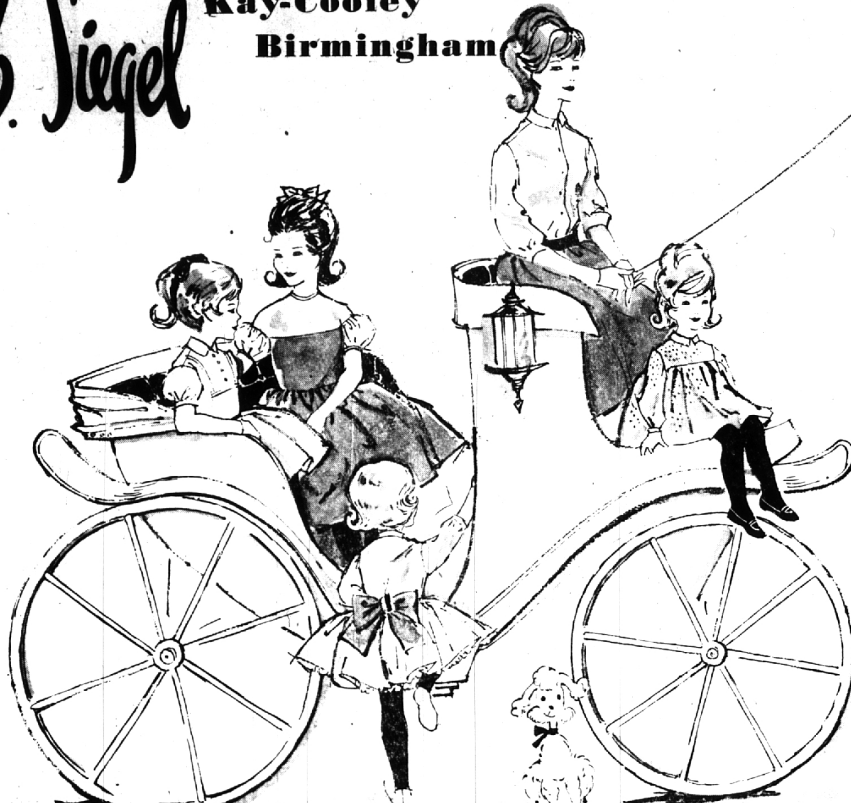
