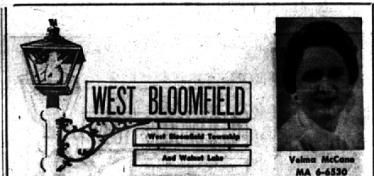

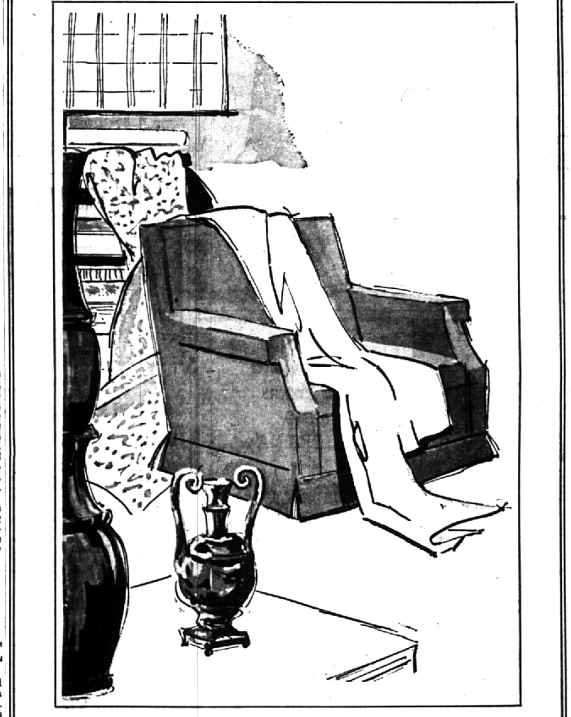
Auxiliary Plans Telephone Bridge
