

Ask Stop Sign At Torry Corner

A request for a stop sign on Torry St. at Bannville and Banbury has been referred to Birmingham Police Chief Ralph W. Moxley.

City commissioners Monday night asked Chief Moxley to report back at next week's meeting.

The stop sign was requested in a letter from Donald A. Henderson, 1558 Bannville, who said that he and his neighbors "are seriously concerned about the traffic problem" at the intersection.

HENDERSON STATED, "This dangerous intersection is only 300 feet south of Torry School; and, with the great number of school children crossing here four times a day, the high speed of Torry traffic presents an open invitation to tragedy."

"A stop sign is urgently needed to control the high speed of vehicles at the Bannville-Banbury crossing."

The invocation was given by Ike Robertson and the Methodist Women's Bell Ringing Choir, under the direction of Robert Peterson, provided special music.

Continuing Ed. Courses At MSUO Set a Record

ROCHESTER — Registration in continuing education courses at Michigan State University Oakland soared to a record 1,040 persons, a 73 per cent increase over fall term enrollment last year.

Continuing education is the division of the university which provides, in addition to other programs, noncredit courses for adults. Over 25 per cent of the adults who enrolled for the classes chose liberal arts courses. All sessions are held on the MSUO campus at Rochester.

"The rapid rise in the number of adults desirous of continuing to learn at Michigan State University Oakland reflects credit upon both the community and the university," declared D. B. Varner, chancellor of MSUO.

"The university assumes as one of its central objectives the offering of high-quality educational experiences to the all-important decision-making adult segment of our society; and we are both pleased and challenged by their tremendous demonstration of interest in cultural and professional development through continuing education."

AS IN PAST terms, introductory courses in foreign languages and instruction in fine arts attracted many adults to the campus. Four languages are being offered — French, German, Russian and Spanish—to a total of 101 students.

One hundred and twenty-two students are enrolled in fine arts courses, the largest group in an optional painting class taught by Mrs. Renee Radell.

Students at present include 46 Pontiac employees, 6 from Ferndale, 4 from Troy, 4 from St. Clair Shores, 2 from Oak Park and 1 from Clawson.

Instructor is Aleck Capalis, personnel director of Bendix Research Laboratories, Southfield.

A 10-week "Seminar in Small Business Management" is bringing 54 businessmen to the campus to hear lectures by experts in small business drawn from universities and firms in the metropolitan area.

Amidst the national controversy as to whether or not "Johnny can read," MSUO's continuing education program evidences that his mother and father are anxious to read better and faster.

"Efficient Reading," offered again this term because of its past popularity, attracted an overflow enrollment. Opening a second section of the course still couldn't accommodate all those desirous of

improving their reading speed and comprehension.

THE MUNICIPAL administration course is designed specifically for municipal employees. Two sections of the course are being taught as the city of Pontiac alone registered enough of its employees to nearly fill a section.

Those unable to find places in this term's classes will be given priority when the winter term begins in early January. The course is taught by Mrs. Mildred Wiesema who begins the term by analyzing each individual student's needs and difficulties in reading.

The next term of courses will commence Jan. 15, 1962. Individuals interested in receiving informational brochures on the program are asked to write or call the university.
