removal of the trees, the township road committee arranged a meeting of the County Road Commission with the residents.

At the meeting, the Road Commission estimated that to install curbs and gutters would cost an extra \$65,000 to the project and that it would not consider participating on that basis.

RESIDENTS THEN asked the township to delay the project until they could make an attempt to raise the extra money themselves. The township agreed to delay it a year.

Meanwhile the township road committee members made their own analysis of the impact. They decided that the estimated cost of \$65,000 for the curbs and gutters was high. They agreed that the cost to a single neighborhood to pay for their installation was too great. They were sold on the idea that road with curbs and gutters would be a better and longer-lived road than one with ditches.

WITH THESE convictions they approached the county road authorities to convince them that they should participate with the township in furnishing the better, maintenance-free road. They did convince them and the road commission presented the proposal to the township. Their present estimate is that the curbs and gutters will add only \$20,000 to the cost of the road.

BECAUSE OF its road committee, Bloomfield Township will be gaining, for an extra \$10,000, an indubitably better road—worth more than its share of the additional cost.

And the residents keep their beautiful trees whose value cannot be estimated in dollars and cents.
