Mrs. Gordon Co-Chairman Of Metro Opera Committee

Mrs. John F. Gordon, 1860 Rathmore, Bloomfield Hills, has been named co-chairman of the Metropolitan Opera Women's Committee for the 1962 season.

Mrs. Gordon's appointment was made by committee chairman Mrs. George W. Romney, 1830 E. Valley, Bloomfield Hills.

Wife of the president of General Motors Corp., Mrs. Gordon has long been active in cultural and music circles.

SHE HAS BEEN a member of the Women's Committee of the Detroit Grand Opera Association since 1958, concentrating previous activities with the Bloomfield-Birmingham committee.

With the announcement of Mrs. Gordon's appointment, the co-chairmanship came an announcement that the opening night performance of the 1962 season, May 21, will be for the benefit of the Detroit Symphony Society. This announcement was made jointly by Frank W. Donovan, president of the Detroit Grand Opera Association, and John B. Ford, Jr., chairman of the board of directors of the Detroit Symphony Society.

In the three previous Metropolitan seasons the opening night was for the benefit of the Detroit Institute of Arts.

SPEAKING OF the 1962 season, Donovan said that, as this year's seven operas would be presented in six days, but added that the program had not yet been completed.

It is expected that the entire seven-opera week will be announced in mid-November and that ticket sales would begin immediately.

Unlike the procedure followed in previous years, Donovan said that mail applications and a public sale at the Ford Auditorium box office would be held simultaneously.

Van Dusen Offers Con-Con Group Speed-Up Plan

A proposal by Con Con Delegate Richard Van Dusen (E-Birmingham) to speed up convention activity, set a Nov. 8 deadline for all nine substantive committees to report proposed timetables for three basic steps. Van Dusen is chairman of the rules and resolutions committee.

The first step provides for a review and study of all existing constitutional provisions within a committee's jurisdiction. The study would determine history of these provisions, extent to which they meet state needs and areas in which improvement seems necessary.

The second step covers consideration of all proposed changes in the existing constitution that fall under the jurisdiction of each committee. Changes could be embodied in delegate proposals or collected elsewhere.

THE THIRD STEP provides for committee preparation of proposals or proposals which would go to the floor for actual debate and for supporting material relating to such proposals.

Van Dusen said the three basic steps could be followed by each committee to facilitate its work with each committee setting up its own timetable for each step. Dates could be flexible, he added.

He also suggested a uniform schedule of substantive meetings that would mean only three of the delegates would have two meetings at the same time.
