Church Women Will Observe Community Day

United Church Women of Birmingham will join the national observance of World Community Day on 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. at Northminster Presbyterian Church.

This year's theme, "Freedom to Grow," highlights United Church Women's program of peace, education and action.

Dr. W. Glenn Harris, minister of First Presbyterian Church of Birmingham, will be the speaker. Dr. Harris, who has spent considerable time in the Latin American countries, will base his talk on the needs of these countries.

DEVOTIONS will be given by the Rev. Mackay Taylor, minister of Northminster Presbyterian Church, and special music will be provided by the Methodist Women's Hand-Bell Choir under the direction of Rodney Peterson.

Local chairman for the observance is Mrs. N. Ralph Tucker. Church women are making school bags and equipping them with supplies and sewing and collecting children's clothing which will be distributed in the Latin American countries where an effort is being made to increase educational opportunities.

WORLD COMMUNITY Day offerings will go toward training Latin American women in adult education and furthering United Church Women's international relations program.

Reservations for a noon luncheon may be made through individual church representatives.

A nursery will be provided for pre-school children.

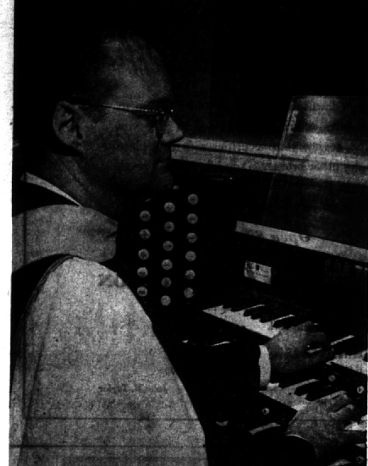

Concert Series Opens Sunday at St. James

St. James Episcopal Church begins its new concert series Sunday with church organist Kent McDonald playing the opening recital. An accomplished organist and pianist, McDonald will inaugurate the series of five subscription musical programs at 8:15 p.m. in the church, 355 W. Maple, Birmingham.

This first program will serve as a dedication recital for St. James' newly rebuilt and enlarged organ. The console is built to suit and may be moved into the chancel area where both the artist and organ can be seen.

McDONALD HAS appeared as soloist with the Eastman-Rochester Symphony of New York and the American Guild of Organists. He is chairman of the American Guild of Organists in Michigan. Born in Phoenix, Ariz., McDonald decided upon music as a career at an early age.

Following service in the Air Force during World War II, he received a scholarship for advanced study under the noted pianist and teacher, Helene Merzway, in New York City.

A year later he continued his piano studies under Jose Schmitt and organ studies with Ray Berry at the Eastman School of Music in Rochester, N. Y.
