Exam Dates Set for Guard

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Congressman William S. Broomfield (Rep.—Oakland County) has announced that the nation-wide competitive examination for entrance to the U. S. Coast Guard Academy will be held Feb. 19 and 1962. These examinations will be given in 156 cities.

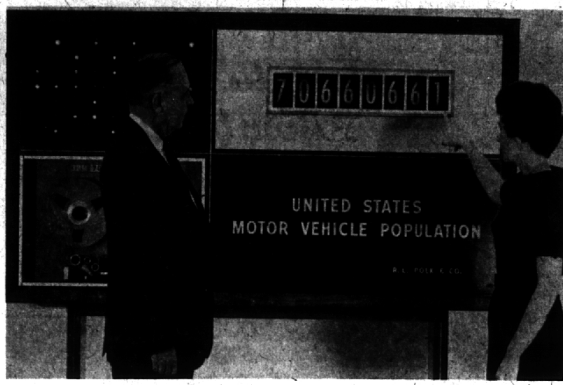
Congressman Broomfield emphasized the opportunity offered young men who choose this four-year course which leads to a commission as a career officer in America's oldest sea-going Armed Service and a Bachelor of Science degree.

"Appointments are made on a competitive basis; there are no separate quotas for states or districts and no special categories," he said.

"I URGE ALL qualified young men who are interested in this worthwhile profession to write for details and application as soon as possible to the Commandant (PTP), Coast Guard Headquarters, Washington 25, D. C. Completed applications must be post-marked on or before Jan. 10, 1962."

A candidate for the next examination for the Coast Guard Academy must be a single, must have reached his seventeenth but not his twenty-second birthday by July 1, 1962 and must be in excellent physical condition.

A high school diploma is the minimum educational requirement, although high school seniors assured of being graduated by June 30 are eligible to take the examination if they will have at least 18 credits by that date. All applicants must have three units of English, two in Algebra, and one in Plane Geometry by graduation.

MEA Proposes Village For Retired Teachers

Plans for providing housing for retired teachers recently was announced by the Michigan Education Association.

The proposed retirement village, "Meha Village," is designed to establish housing facilities for retired personnel of Michigan public schools and colleges.

The village is being organized by the Michigan Education Home Association, a corporation chartered by the MEA.

INITIALLY, ABOUT 500 persons will be accommodated by the village which is scheduled to be completed in the fall of 1965. "Meha Village" will provide the residents with recreational, cultural and educational opportunities, along with such physical benefits as comfortable through the University of Michigan Hospital and Medical School.

It is expected that eventually "Meha Village" will be able to accommodate about 1500 residents on its 400-acre site about 10 miles from Ann Arbor.

The retirement village is a fairly new concept in providing housing for older people in that it provides more independence for the resident than does the institutional type of retirement facility. "Meha Village" is the outgrowth of the "Bay City Dream," a proposed home for retired teachers.

THE OVERWHELMING approval of this project by active and retired Michigan educators resulted in the establishment of the Michigan Education Home Association. The board of governors of MEHA, a non-profit, private independent corporation, studied plans for financing facilities for retired educators and set up "Meha Village" as the best means of providing attractive, economical, spacious, and

Diversified Industry Guides JA Companies

Thousands of industries across the nation are actively backing small junior size firms in an effort to show the U. S. teenager what makes business really tick.

Giant corporations and small industries alike are providing volunteer advisory teams to guide but not direct the destinies of teenage-staffed Junior Achievement companies.

H. John Lowry, president of Michigan Mutual Liability Co. and president of Junior Achievement of Southeastern Michigan, recently said that, "U. S. business and industry has a great stake in the nation's future and in the future of the American teenager. In creating an intelligent work-force of leaders and employes, business is assuring itself of its most singular need—hard-working employes who know where they're going and why."

LOWRY SAID that the nation must expose teenagers to free enterprise and let them work in this system even though merits of our

system are revealed in individual freedom, material wealth and human dignity.

"These are treated as a matter of course," he said, "without fully realizing that our free competitive society is the responsible agent."

Lauding the American business world for contributing to America's future strength and greatness, Lowry cited the diversified industry responsible for backing Junior Achievement companies in the Birmingham area.

HE SAID 120 teenagers are currently employed by eight JA business centers at the Junior Achievement business center located at 177 South Woodward in Birmingham. Some firms, he added, counsel more than one miniature company.

Currently sponsoring JA firms are: Burroughs Corp., Ford division, Ford Motor Co., Ford Central Staff, General Motors Technical Center, The J. L. Hudson Co., International Business Machines Corp. and Standard Oil division of American Oil Co.

Birmingham Post Office Wins Nat'l Safety Honor

National honors for outstanding driver safety performance were won last week by the Birmingham Post Office in the 30th annual National Fleet Safety Contest conducted by the National Safety Council.

The Birmingham Post Office fleet, consisting of 35 vehicles and 48 drivers, was awarded third place in the Group No. 2 Post Office Division of the contest in Chicago.

The award is based on the company's safety performance from July, 1960, through June, 1961. During the period the post office's

drivers operated 342,857 miles and had 118 accidents per 100,000 vehicle miles of operation.

ALL ACCIDENTS were counted in the contest except those occurring when a company vehicle was properly parked.

Winners were determined after inspection of their records by an auditor appointed by the National Fleet Safety Contest committee.

Some 2,500 fleets competed in the contest. They operated 295,000 vehicles and traveled six and a quarter billion miles.
