Chbrook Institute Has Bird Display

A display of renderings in semi-precious stones of Audubon's "Birds of America" can now be seen at Cranbrook Institute of Science.

The display is composed of 24 interpretations of Audubon's designs which have been carved over the past decade at the famed Germantown stone-cutting center of Idara Stone markets were combed until just the right color and pattern for a particular bird were found.

A JAY IS DONE in lapis lazuli and an eagle in crocodile but the blue winged teal was a particularly difficult one due to the varied colors. Spotted-brown jasper forms part of the body, lapis lazuli is set into the wings, while tiger-eye, Malaya's-eye and white and yellow jades finish it off.

"Birds of America" will remain All-A display at the Institute of Science through November. The Institute is open daily from 2 to 5 p.m., except major holidays.

\$6 Million Road Bond Issue Sought

The Ways and Means Committee of the Oakland County Board of Supervisors has approved plans for a \$6 million bond issue for county road improvements.

The committee will recommend that supervisors approve the bond issue at their Nov. 7 meeting in Pontiac.

Acting on advice of County Road Commission Chairman Hiland M. Thatcher, the Ways and Means Committee agreed last week to endorse the plan to raise the money through general obligation bonds.

Improvements are slated for roads connecting with the freeway system now under construction in the county.

Birmingham and neighboring communities have been asked to share in the cost of several areas roads.

Hawkins Trains In Army Exercise

Marines Prepare Training Operation

Marine Pfc. James W. Milks, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Milks, 1204 Bird, and Pfc. Ross C. Rector, son of Mr. and Mrs. T. C. Rector, of 708 Oakland, Birmingham, are serving with the First Marine Brigade assaulting beaches on the Island of Maui in the largest maneuver of its kind to take place in the Hawaiian Islands since World War II. The brigade is a unit of amphibious task force scheduled to take part in operation "Silver Sword" Oct. 30.

A routine training exercise to improve proficiency and teamwork in amphibious techniques, the operation will consist of 25 ships, 100 Marine Corps aircraft and more than 10,000 sailors and marines. Climaxing several days intensive training in the arpa, the operation will begin when the first wave of the assault hits selected beaches on Maunaloa Bay shortly after midnight and is met by "Opposing" forces to provide realistic combat training.
