 valuation as opposed to a current \$32.75 in Southfield. The increase in Southfield would mean about \$3.30 more over present taxes.

A three-mill tax levy was approved by Southfield Voters in 1959; the last bond issue for \$4 million, was okayed in 1957.

BEING CONSIDERED also are four classrooms and offices at Lathrup School, seven classes and library at Northbrook School as well as additions to two other schools.

Board members have planned several meetings to prepare building schedules and priority as related to the various schools.

 the same bit, Blackstone's famous Vanishing Bird Cage. It's his tribute to a master magician and friend, whose autographed photo is one of Sullivan's prized possessions.

Although the magic shop stores countless magic tricks all neatly arranged in labeled boxes, Sullivan has invented and patented four or five new tricks and is perfecting as many more.

He has a special rabbit, Italian dwarf rabbits for other professional magicians. And he counts on his wife Debby to be his severest critic. She obliges. A simple card trick sometimes takes 16 hours to master, that's why he only does about three or four charity shows a year.

THOUGH HE SPENDS untold hours in the whimsical atmosphere of his magic shop, Sullivan is no sloth as a suburbanite.

In the three years he's lived on 14 Mile Road, a miracle of restoration has taken place over the 14 acre and old farmhouse he bought. It took more than a magic wand to trim back the tangled overgrowth. It took Sullivan's characteristic good nature and infectious enthusiasm, the things that make him "the magician you won't forget" from the town that time forgot.

He also pleaded guilty to being a minor in possession of alcoholic beverages.

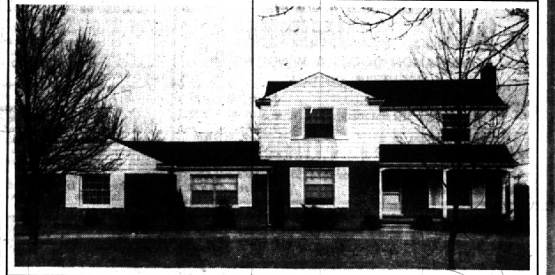

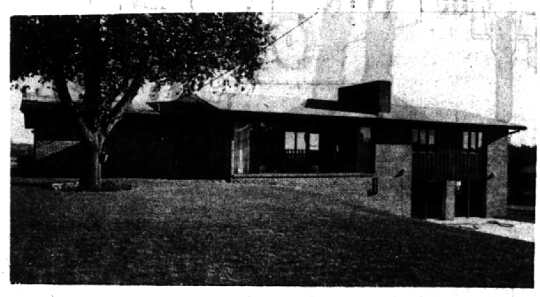

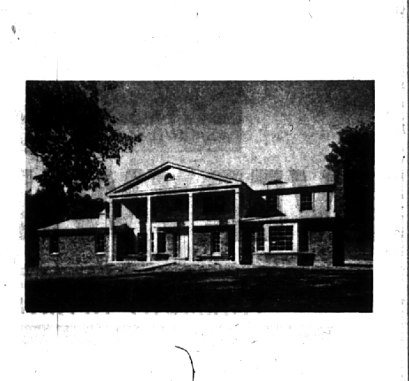
