Man Arraigned In Two-Year-Old Conversion Case

BLOOMFIELD TOWNSHIP—The arraignment of Malcolm Sanders in Oakland County Circuit Court Monday was the latest step in a case going back two years and revived Aug. 29 of this year when William Hayes, 675 Vinewood, Birmingham, filed a complaint against Sanders.

The complaint, made before Justice of the Peace Alice Gilbert was on two counts: larceny by conversion and violation of a builder's trust fund.

Sanders pleaded not guilty Monday and his court before Judge Russell Holland and bond was continued at \$5,000. No trial date has been set.

IN HIS COMPLAINT, Hayes alleged he had entered into a written contract with Sanders for the purchase of a home two years ago. Hayes claimed his \$5,000 deposit was not returned nor was the house built.

At the time of the complaint, Sanders was then living in Florida. Extradition proceedings began immediately. Judge Gilbert said on Township Det. James Keller brought Sanders back from Tampa on Oct. 12.

Sanders pleaded not guilty and Judge Gilbert set bond at \$5,000 pending his examination before her on Oct. 17 at which time Sanders was bound over to Circuit Court.

flow of traffic on Lahser with no major traffic tie-ups.

Parents have complained that, besides danger to children who must cross Lahser to and from schools, there was delay to cars coming from school parking lots in obtaining access on Lahser.

A report by Township Road Commissioner Fred Chapman on the situation found that many of the cars from the school "had to wait to drive between five and eight minutes before actually getting into Lahser."

IN A REPORT made a year ago, Oakland County Road Commission, which would have to approve installation of a light on a county road, refused to pay for installation of a traffic light in front of the schools.

The commission did say it would consider giving approval of a light to be operated "for school purposes only" during the period schools were taking in or letting out pupils.

Parents appeared before the township board two weeks ago seeking to get the township to pay for installation of the light which would cost approximately \$1,400.


