Decision on Water Tank Awaits Recreation Plans

Birmingham city commissioners made it clear Monday night that until they get detailed plans for recreational use of the former sewer plant property they'll consider other plans for it. City Manager L. R. Gare asked whether he should negotiate with the Southeastern Oklahoma County Water Authority for sale of a portion of the city-owned 66 acres as a site for a water storage reservoir. Commissioners William H. Burdum, Carl Ingram and William E. Roberts all insisted that no other plans be considered for the property on Cranbrook at 14 Mile until the recreational use has been decided. They pointed out that the commission, city plan board and recreation board had all agreed that the property be designated for recreation. Gare pointed out that future plans of the water authority include construction of a new water main from the west with a pumping station to be located at 12 Mile and Telegraph. Smith Seeks R-6 Zoning for Lots On Hazel Street

HUBERT G. Smith, whose recent request to rezone property at 1078 Hazel from R-3 residential to R-1 non-residential was approved by the City to rezone to R-6 multiple dwelling. City commissioners Monday night referred his newest petition to the city plan board. Smith had proposed selling his six 20-foot lots at the Hazel-Adams intersection to a local building firm which planned to erect a one-story professional office building. Residents of the area objected to the proposed rezoning because the location was more suitable to residential than commercial development. City commissioners Monday night granted Birmingham Rotary Club permission to hold its annual paper sale on city streets Friday, Nov. 17. Proceeds are used for the club's charitable programs. Whittle Explains Plan for College To Commission

"We wish you well," was the parting comment by Mayor Willette H. Willett to Melvin (Doc) Whittle after he explained his plan for a College of Performing Arts in Birmingham to city commissioners Monday night. Commissioners suggested that Whittle consult the city plan board for its views on the proposal. Whittle said he feels "Birmingham is an ideal site for such a college" and asked if it would "fit in with the future planning of Birmingham." He is proposing a college that would offer a fine arts degree. Students at some other institution courses at first, then take three years at the local school. Plans are still "in the embryonic stage," Whittle stated. He said the Michigan Board of Higher Instruction has tentatively approved the plan, pending arrangements for a subsidy program. "HAVE YOU any specific location in mind?" asked Mayor Willette. "No, but we want one in the Birmingham-Bloomfield area. We have several people in the real estate business looking for us now," Whittle replied. Whittle, who is head of the Young People's Studio Theatre in Birmingham, said the college would offer courses in acting, directing and set construction and would be accredited. He told commissioners that there are several universities offering a fine arts degree "but you must get a liberal arts degree along with it." He said there are two other colleges in the country similar to the one he is proposing, one of which is not accredited. "We hope ours will be acceptable to other schools," he declared. No formal action was taken.

R. J. Alexander, director of the county DPW, said in a letter to Birmingham City Manager L. R. Gare that no charges will be made for excess flows in 1960 and 1961. Gare suggested that a thorough study be made of the problem locally, including the possibility of building an intercepting type of combined sewer.
