Duck Limits Lower Early Season Take

Michigan's duck hunters did well during the first two weeks of their Oct. 15-Nov. 11 season, thanks to favorable hunting conditions and bird numbers.

Reports from the Conservation Department's 28 check areas indicate that the per cent of successful duck hunters increased or bettered last year's estimate in most areas.

Unfortunately, "sky shooting" caused crippling losses to run high and kept many hunters from making the daily two-bird quota. The bag limit, itself, held down the total take.

Fortunately, many hunters reported the same or higher in 22 of the Department's check areas as compared with a year ago. Upper peninsula hunters complained that many local ducks had left their area prior to the season's late opener.
