It didn't seem like the kind of comment that would come from a man who just a few weeks ago lost his contract as general manager of the Detroit Pistons basketball organization.

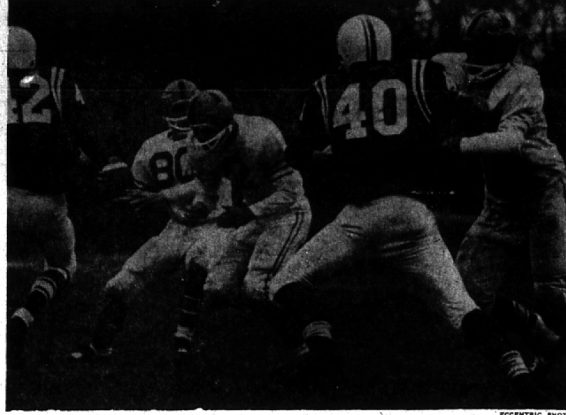

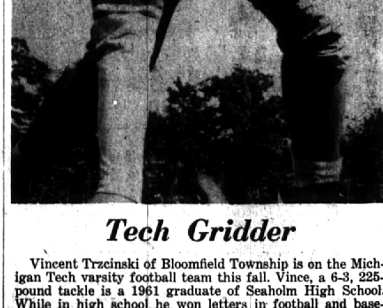
