**B'ham District Receives School Aid Payment**

Birmingham School District has received \$198,872.50 as its payment of state school aid in a quarterly distribution announced last week.

School officials said the money will go into general operating funds for school district expenses.

Dr. Lynn M. Bartlett, state superintendent of public instruction, announced last week state aid payments totaling approximately \$28,300,000.

School districts received 75 percent of the actual amount due.

Bartlett said it is hoped that another payment on Oct. 25 will be equal to at least 75 percent of the amount due.

He said it appears that in November about \$20 million of Primary School Interest Fund money will be available for distribution.

**ALL RIGHT, DON'T VOTE**

Michigan Constitutional Convention delegates will be elected September 12. But only a handful of people will elect them. Across the length and breadth of this great state, they tell me, people will stay at home because they don't understand—or didn't care to learn about—the most important single election in Michigan in more than 50 years.

I deplore this apathy. And, yet, political strategy says I should welcome it. I've been told that the only hope a Democrat has of being elected in Oakland County's heavily Republican Third District is if most of the Republicans stay home and all the Democrats vote. Maybe the political dopsters are right.

But if they are, I don't want to win. I don't want to be elected as your Con-Con delegate by a handful of voters. I'd rather lose in a huge outpouring of voters.

No, I'm not running just for the sake of the race, or even for the sake of my party. I'm in the race to win; but I don't want to win by default. I have no intention of representing only part of the people of the Third District.

If I'm elected, I'll represent all of the people—Republicans as well as Democrats and non-Republican voters as well. Non-voters, too.

If you care at all about how your children—and their children—will live in years to come; if you're at all concerned about the system of laws that will govern your state, then I

earnestly solicit your vote. I'm a Democrat. Perhaps YOU'RE a Republican. Frankly, I don't care. I do hope you'll vote, in any case. And, certainly, I hope you'll vote for me. I've campaigned long and earnestly. I've answered every question asked me according to my conscience and my convictions.

What do I stand for? I stand for—and if elected I will work for—one full vote for every citizen of Michigan. I believe we need a new and simple constitution — one which lays the ground rules but doesn't try to judge tomorrow's needs on the basis of today's resources. I'm for judicial reform, for longer terms for state officials... there isn't room, nor is this the time for me to spell out a complete program. Besides, the Constitutional Convention will be a give-and-take affair, a matter of fair compromise, an earnest and, I hope, forthright interchange of ideas to be followed by sensible agreement on basic principles.

The post I seek is one involving hard work, long study, a creative approach to the problems of self-government and, frankly, considerable personal sacrifice on my part. Yet I will welcome an opportunity to serve you. This is no little task for little men. This is a challenge, a time for greatness. With your support, we'll meet that challenge.
