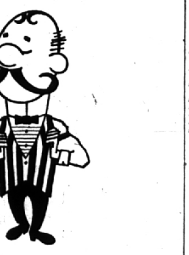

commode 78 trailers and 226 tenters.
Women are particularly interested in a visit to Green Gables, the farmhouse immortalized by the late Lucy Mauds Montgomery in her novel, "Anne of Green Gables". The little house is at Cavendish.

An interesting PEI side trip involves the scale models of seven well-known structures—York Minster Cathedral, Grey's Church of "Elegy" fame, Penn Manor House, Mill on the Plover, Glamis Castle, and the birthplaces of Shakespeare and Ann Hathaway.

THREE ARE SITUATED at Woodleigh, near Kensington, and constructed as a hobby by Lt. Col. E. W. Johnston. Meticulous in detail, the York Minster Cathedral, for instance, took Johnston five years to build of stone, slate, and leaded stained glass windows.

Supper near Summerside, the island's top summer locale, then on to the ferry at Borden, and our landing at Cape Tormentine, N. B. We pulled along side our trailer in Purdy National Park at 12:30 a.m. after a long, restful evening day.

We spent the next day—Sunday—exploring the park, its community recreation facilities, its nature trails, drives and coves.

MONDAY SAW US REACH our Canadian terminals, Oak Day Provincial Park, five miles from the Maine border. En route we spent an interesting hour watching the "reversing rapids" in the St. John River at Saint John. Here, as at Moncton, the incoming tides seem to make the river flow upstream.

In our day-long trip across Maine, we thought the coast road from Calais to Ellsworth would show us some of the "rock-bound" shore. We didn't see any of it. Apparently one must take the private flow upstream.

The Maine highway we traveled always had forests or hills at our left, obscuring a view of the sea. We did catch a glimpse of the mountains in Acadia National Park near Bar Harbor, some miles across a bay. Well, maybe next time...

THAT NIGHT WE SET the trailer down next to my sister's cottage on Lake Winnepesaukee, four miles south of Wolfboro, N. H. The cottage was vacant. My sister and her youngsters at that moment were on their way back to Birmingham after several days at my mother's cottage at Ludington on Lake Michigan. Our two families would be together until two days later.

So my family spent those two days visiting the historic places in and around Boston. We were guests of my brother-in-law, Donald P. Babson, and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Paul T. Babson. Then back to Winnepesaukee—the Averetts and all Babsons—for three days of swimming, boating, and water skiing.

ONLY TOO SOON we had to hitch our trailer to the car and make tracks for Birmingham and our vacation's end. Across New Hampshire, through the Green Mountains of Vermont to Albany and the New York Thruwayway. An overnight stop at Niagara Falls so our youngsters could get their first look at this natural phenomenon across Ontario to Saratoga and home.

We had been on the road 27 days, and driven 4715 miles (including the side trip to Boston). It really was a scouting expedition—hitch I'll return there again some of these days. Only I'll spread it over two or three summers. I'll concentrate on becoming really familiar with Quebec province and its Gaspé ocean vacation, with New Brunswick and Nova Scotia another, and Cape Breton and PEI in a third.

WE LEFT CANADA TIRED PHYSICALLY but refreshed mentally. The country, while old in geography and settlement, has just started its growth. To me, this Canadian growth seems energetic yet calm. Unlike the frenzied commercial pace, the strained, forced social and business relationships which characterize the States.

Perhaps I'm being lured back by Canada's beautiful invigorating outdoor freshness when compared to the States' smoke-filled, noisy indoor arena. My concluding article next week will be directed at the trailer enthusiasts in the audience. We'll talk trailers and trailer life.
