Bishops Visit St. James During Confab

St. James Episcopal Church will host two guest preachers during the 60th General Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States in Detroit's Cobo Hall Sept. 17-23.

The Rt. Rev. James W. Hunter D.D., Bishop of the missionary district of Wyoming, will preach Sept. 17 and 18. The Rt. Rev. St. James Kennedy D.D., S.T.D., Bishop of Honolulu, will preach Sept. 19.

Bishop Hunter served his early ministry in the South. Consecrated Bishop Coadjutor of Wyoming in 1948, he became Bishop of Wyoming the following year.

HE IS PRESIDENT of the Sixth Province of the Episcopal Church and a member of the Joint Budget Committee of the General Convention. In addition, he is chairman of the Program and Budget Committee for 1961.

Bishop Kennedy's early ministry was spent as a missionary priest in Kansas and Colorado. Following service as an Army Chaplain during World War II, he was stationed with the island of Hawaii military forces in the Pacific at Honolulu.
