**New Trimester Plan Under Way at MSUO**

Michigan State University Oakland recently welcomed its first group of freshmen students who will graduate in two and two-thirds years instead of four. They will do so because they will be attending classes on the year-round Trimester Plan voted by the faculty and approved by the board of trustees during the winter. The 500 new freshmen, screened from almost 750 applicants, will attend three 15-week semesters. The normal college year provides for two 16-week semesters. The fall semester starts Sept. 5 and will run through Dec. 22; winter semester from Jan. 2 through April 16; spring semester from April 25 through Aug. 10.

THE USUAL recesses will continue Christmas, New Year, Easter, Memorial Day and Independence Day. The plan fulfills a commitment made in the planning of the liberal arts-centered university to go to year-round operation as soon as feasible. This commitment was made because it was felt that it was essential to make fullest possible use of the costly plant facilities and secure teaching resources. The college population will be at least doubled within nine years, according to the most conservative estimates by the U. S. Office of Education and others. This means that higher education's plant and its teaching staff must either have comparable increases or be used more efficiently.

THE TRIMESTER PLAN, Chancellor D. B. Varner said, will make it possible to accommodate one-third more students with the same size plant and with only a very modest increase in faculty. This will mean reducing the need for expensive capital outlays, and since college teachers are becoming increasingly scarce, the plan will help by making fuller use of available teaching talents. A Trimester Plan, rather than four quarters or some other plan, was chosen, Varner said, to avoid any chance that the extra term would be regarded as a summer program, and therefore less important or less rigorous. Faculty members will be paid for the extra term at a usual salary for the most conservative mer-session rate of three per cent of their annual salary per week. This will mean a 45 per cent boost in income for the 15-week period.

NO PROFESSOR will be compelled to participate, and none will be permitted to teach more than five consecutive terms. The other

target," but that was as far as his attack went.  
THE FIASCO started when an officer who was to open the attack suddenly decided it was all a bad idea and withdrew without firing a shot. Things began getting disorganized. Several Confederates were forced to order a general charge. It simply didn't materialize. No one charged. The Yankees withdrew, and Lee finally withdrew himself.  
Next day, on a reconnaissance, Lee's close friend, Col. D. C. Washington, grandson of the first President of the United States and inheritor of Mount Vernon, was killed by Yankee pickets, and Lee's disappointment was complete.
