

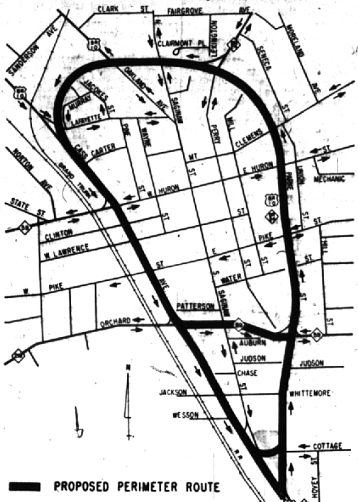
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**PROPOSED PONTIAC PERIMETER ROUTE**  
 US 10 B.R., M-59, M-24 B.R.



**Set Public Hearing on Proposed Route**

Construction of a proposed perimeter road circling the downtown Pontiac business district will be discussed at a public hearing in Pontiac today.  
 The hearing will begin at 8 p.m. in the City Commission room of the Pontiac City Hall.  
 State Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie said the purpose of the hearing will be to discuss the economic impact of the project and its influence on the community.

**THE LOOP WOULD** encircle about 150 acres of downtown Pontiac and make extensive use of existing streets.  
 City and Highway Department planners propose the route be constructed on the following locations: Starting at Woodward and 4th Parke streets, it would follow Parke north to E. Huron street, then run east on relocation to School street.  
 It would follow School street west to Saginaw street, then run southwest on relocation to Oakland and Cass Avenues.  
 The route would then follow Cass to Orchard Lake and then run north on Woodward on relocation to Woodward.

**THE HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT** and relocation of the U.S. 10 and US-24 business routes will help relieve congestion on Saginaw and Oakland streets.  
 All movement on the loop would be counter clockwise. Major east-bound movements from one side of the loop to the other would be on Orchard Lake and Cottage street in the southern half of the perimeter.  
 The city has tentatively agreed to pay about 20 per cent of the total cost of the project. The Highway Department would finance the balance with federal aid, state funds.
