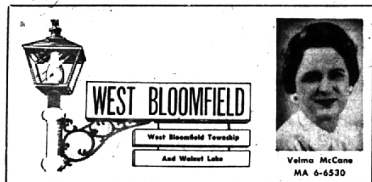

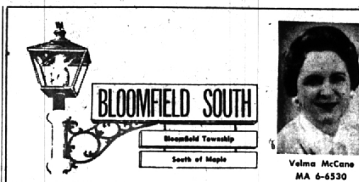
ATTENDANTS were attired in
