UNTIL THE COMMISSION is granted some concessions at these three locations and others that may arise later, it plans to withhold approval of bridges, interchanges, road closings, and final alignment along the entire route.

OTHER EXPRESSWAY questions include: closing of Rochester Road, one of the city's major arteries; relocation of fire stations near the expressway crossovers to enable trucks to quickly reach homes on either side of the Chrysler; providing pedestrian crossovers for school children; and designing exit and entrance ramps so traffic can merge safely with the city's other streets and roads.

### Troy Resident Stands Mute In Slashing

Troy resident William G. Gravin, 27, accused of slaying his cousin's wife Aug. 28, stood mute in an arraignment last week before Circuit Judge H. Russel Holland.

Gravin is being held at Oakland County jail in lieu of \$5,000 bond. Judge Holland reduced bond from the \$10,000 set by Troy Justice of the Peace Charles H. Lacey when he bound the Royal Oak fireman over to the circuit court.

Trial date will be set in October, according to the county prosecutor's office.

SOUGHT BY over 60 policemen and volunteers, Gravin, 2626 Rochester Road, was arrested five years after he allegedly slashed Mrs. Robert Gravin in front of her residence at 1058 Henrietta, Troy.

She suffered cuts under her chin and on her left temple and was treated at William Beaumont Hospital.

Gravin, a Royal Oak fireman, was apprehended as he walked unafraid on Rochester Road. He said he had been drinking in his statement at the county prosecutor's office.
