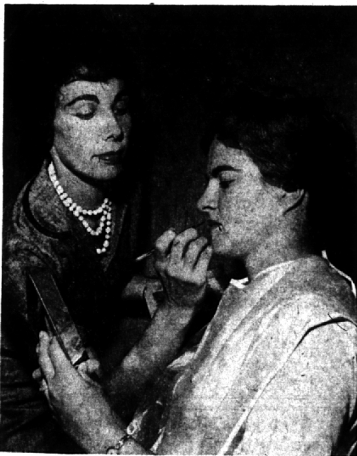




Belle, Ball and Bridge

When the weeds stop growing, And the grass doesn't need a mowing, To sit around and socialize. When the picnic table is put away, And we don't see our neighbors everyday.

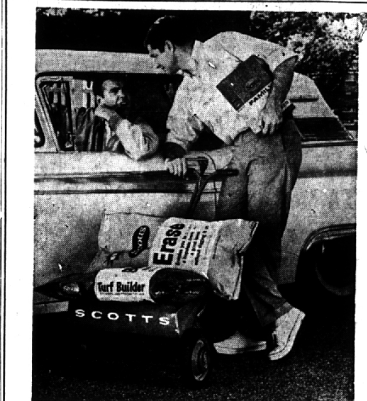
That's the time we want to start the makings, For fun and such undertakings. Your association would like your advice.
