Taylor Seeks Legislation On Sanity

Oakland County Prosecutor George F. Taylor said Monday he will ask State Senator Farrell E. Roberts to introduce legislation to declare former mental patients sane six months after they are released from an institution if their records since release are clean.

Taylor was prompted by the realization that many former mental patients have resumed normal lives without ever being legally declared sane.

He said he has been assured of support from state mental health director Charles F. Wargz and Pontiac State Hospital Medical Supt. Walter Obenauf.

THE MORE immediate cause of action was the fact that an 18-year-old former mental patient was charged with statutory rape in an assault on a two-year-old Ferndale girl.

The rapist could avoid prosecution, it was explained, by claiming he is still mentally ill. He was discharged in 1959.

Present law stipulates that petitions must be filed in circuit court asking a hearing to certify a patient as sane, but many people never carry out this formality.
