DOWN TO EARTH
B'ham Garden Clubs
Sharing Local Tours

The local garden clubs are stirring at this date and many are sharing garden tours. The Orange branch of National Farm and Garden sponsored a tour of the gardens of Mrs. Joseph Dworski, Mrs. Nat. Reiss, Mrs. A. J. Mackey, Mrs. James Charter and Mrs. Sam Williams. All of these stops provide lessons in garden culture for the visitors. As both Mr. and Mrs. Dworski are identified with art, they enjoyed developing their site, nestled in the woods of East Long Lake. As an architect, our host, has used large expanses of glass to bring the beauty of the woods into the home.

A PATIO DOORYARD, which had geometric patterns with pebbles and textures of plant materials, was very effective. As he had unexcused the garden, the fully looked for a particular tree to give an architectural, interesting profile to the courtyard. He had planted a Siberian Pea shrub 17 1/2 in. in diameter to meet his fancy. It gave him the Mrs. Burlingame dividends of yellow spring flowers, unusual pods that fall, and lacy textured leaves to embellish the profile with the Japanese look.

At Dworski's there was a greenhouse of the kitchen with a contemporary plan to carry out the theme of the architectural design. Unusual accessories for the garden as well as the interior brought forth continual exclamations from the visitors. The Royal Oak branch of the National Farm and Garden Association invited all interested gardeners from the county to be guests for a garden party in the gardens of the Arthur Hydes at 342 Waddington Road. Here on the home grounds of a second architect, it was interesting to study his use of plant material to complement his structure. This garden was reported upon minutely a couple years ago. It is truly a masterpiece within our town.

IN THIS GARDEN I saw pictures and heard a report of a group of women who have seen a park area within their municipality filled with rare wild flowers and orchids. As this garden stands in the conservation of park areas to be dedicated recreational purposes, they began three years ago to develop pathways and label plants for nature lovers within the twenty three acre site known as Cunningham Park, adjacent to Berz Airport.

This sanctuary for nature lovers can be found by driving on Fourteen Mile Road, off Leafdale Avenue, not far from Crooke Road. Orchids to these dedicated women

who have had the foresight to preserve this area. If your home is on a corner and you feel the need of privacy, you might benefit from stopping and studying the plan of the J. P. Pika at 3360 Adams, corner of Wendover. They have built a fence having a redwood finish with the total height being divided into two levels which gives the view a three dimensional effect.

THERE IS THE service area and the enclosed patio off the dining room. Although they are only a few feet from the next home, this planning does give them privacy. If you have a vacant lot, which you keep landscaped, you will find it helpful to drive by 845 Saffield and study how they have achieved an outstanding effect with fencing. The width of the fence opening is wide which is pleasing to the eye. The lawn is well kept. There are shrubs, trees, and evergreens which are judiciously placed. The planting is not overdone which allows for easier maintenance.

HERE IS ONE of my experiments I am glad to share: I wanted a vertical accent in my boxwood hedge so I slanted four rows of sharon. They have three or four vertical trunks from the ground level. They have not been allowed

Michigan Leads Nation In Boat Registrations

Michigan has more motorized watercraft on its inland lakes and streams and along its Great Lakes shoreline than do California and Florida combined. James M. Hare, secretary of state, has released figures showing that 57,431 new boat registrations were processed so far this year by the Department of State for a total of 389,286.

"Despite the shorter watercraft season in the Great Lakes area we in Michigan have more than 2 1/2 times as many boats using our waters as they have in the year-round vacationland of Florida," Hare said. "Michigan, of course, is the playground for much of the Middle West and it is natural that vacationing Hoosiers, Buckeyes, and Prairie Staters with cottages here would register their watercraft with us."

"MOREOVER, WITH so many launching sites available to residents and visitors it is possible for many thousands of lower income watercraft enthusiasts to transport their boats by trailer to enjoy the blessings of the many different kinds of lakes and rivers we have in Michigan. "Few people know that Michigan has 3,177 miles of Great Lakes shoreline compared to Florida's

1,197 and California's 1,190 miles of ocean shoreline." Statistics assembled from sources available to the Coast Guard list registrations for the leading boating states as follows: Michigan, 389,286; California, 226,897; Wisconsin, 189,664; Minnesota, 188,214; Texas, 149,418; and Florida, 142,694. 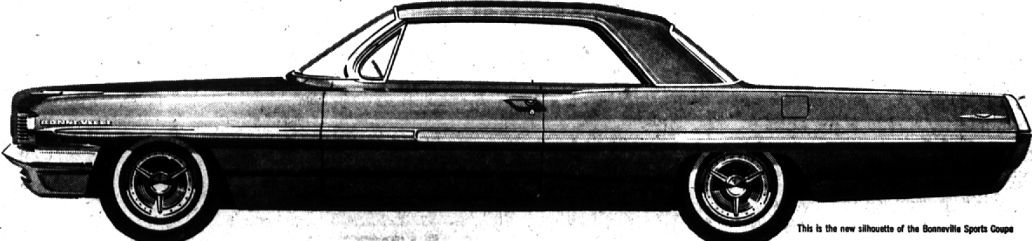
