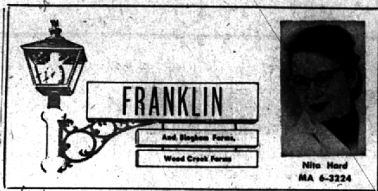


Franklin WSCS To Meet Tuesday To Hear Speaker

S'field High Has Record Enrollment

Southfield High School enrollment soared to a record high last week as the official figures revealed 1,404 students in Grades 10, 11, and 12.

Largest enrollment was in the sophomore class, which contained 567 students. Juniors totaled 455, and seniors totaled 382.

Previous high enrollment was in 1954-55, when grades 8 through 12 totaled 1,391 in the building. Last year 1,315 students registered for the official tally.

VILLAGE OF BEVERLY HILLS ORDINANCE NO. 53

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. 4 ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR THE REGULATION AND USE OF STREETS AND HIGHWAYS, TO PROVIDE FOR THE REGULATION OF MOTOR VEHICLES AND OTHER VEHICLES, TO PROVIDE FOR PEDESTRIAN RIGHTS AND DUTIES; TO DEFINE DUTIES WHERE ACCIDENTS OCCUR; TO PROVIDE FOR ADMINISTRATION; AND TO PROVIDE PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION OF ANY OF THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE."

The Village of Beverly Hills Ordains:

Section 1.01. That Section 32 of Ordinance No. 4 entitled "An Ordinance to Provide for the Regulation and Use of Streets and Highways; to Provide for the Regulation of Motor Vehicles and Other Vehicles; to Provide for Pedestrian Rights and Duties; to Define Duties Where Accidents Occur; to Provide for Administration; and to Provide Penalties for Violation of Any of the Provisions of This Ordinance," be amended by the addition of a new sub-paragraph to be known as sub-paragraph (f), reading as follows:

Section 32 (f). Any person whose operator's or chauffeur's license or registration certificate has been suspended or revoked or whose application for license has been denied as provided in Act 300 of the Public Acts of 1949 as amended and who shall drive any motor vehicle on the streets of this Village or who shall knowingly permit any motor vehicle owned by such person to be operated by another upon any street, except as permitted under said Act 300 of the Public Acts of 1949, as amended, while such license or registration certificate is suspended or revoked or whose application for license has been denied as provided in Act 300 of the Public Acts of 1949, as amended, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction, shall be punished by imprisonment in the Oakland County Jail for a period of not less than two (2) days nor more than ninety (90) days and there may be imposed in addition thereto, a fine of not more than \$100.00, together with the costs of the prosecution.

Section 2.01. This Ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency, which is necessary for the preservation of public health, and safety and shall become effective immediately upon its publication.

Made and passed by the Village of Beverly Hills, this 18th day of September, A.D., 1961.
