

Dress Tips

Don't 'Jingle Jangle' In the Classroom

Campus fashions . . . casual, dressy and in-between. Actually campus fashions are composed of all three styles. The coed's watchword in selecting her clothes should be "mix and match."

DURING YOUR first weeks on the campus wear your new fall school clothes if the weather permits. However, because September is often warm be prepared with one or two dark cottons. TRENCH COATS, blazers, tailored wool or boy coats of hardy fabrics are popular during the winter months. Warm mittens and a scarf to hold down your curls are "musts".
Footwear varies with the needs of the individual. One will see knee socks and wool anklets with loafers and white tennis shoes and hose and low heels on the campus.

FOR SPECTATOR sports such as football or basketball a casual suit, a basic wool dress, or a matching skirt and sweater will take you to the game and to the dance or the fraternity party afterwards. Heels are part of the costume here.

Chief among social events for coeds are teas. To these you may wear anything from a suit to a fairly dressy dress depending on your preference. Heels, hats and gloves are an essential part of the ensemble for luncheons and teas.
Naturally, your biggest and most

discussed problem is what to wear to your first college dance. For the semi-formal dances a cocktail dress, but not a formal, is best. If you are going to a dinner dance, the cocktail dress or a gown of regular dress length in chiffon, lace or peau de soie is appropriate.

IF THE DANCE announcements proclaim optional dress, it is best to conform with your friend's decision. Usually a dressy wool or silk shantung will take you in high style to the fraternity or sorority dance.

For a stag affair or casual party, a suit or casual dress of wool, jersey or acetate fabric will be a happy medium between classroom and "special" date attire.

In the whirl of fashion tips, keep in mind that personal grooming puts the final touch on attractive appearance. Hair should be styled to fit the person. A hairdo that can take a brushing will always look neat and a minimum of make-up will take less time.
