Detroit Bank Opens Trust 'Suite' in City

A striking new concept in office design and furnishing was unveiled this week at Detroit Bank and Trust's office at Woodward and Hamilton in Birmingham.

The new "trust suite" designed to help the bank's trust team of E. James Theodoroff, John Park, and J. Len Wilson serve Birmingham-Bloomfield and Oakland County customers, emphasizes a home-like atmosphere complete with lounge furniture and coffee for visitors.

"The new suite of offices was designed expressly to help provide a maximum of privacy and comfort for our customers while discussing their personal trust needs," Theodoroff said.

"The very nature of the trust business requires a close personal relationship with customers and the motto of this new kind of office will help put customers at ease and make them feel at home so to speak."

DETROIT BANK and Trust is the first bank in the Midwest to develop this new concept in trust office design.

Located in the lower level of the branch building and away from the banking lobby, the three-room trust suite includes a reception area and two adjoining conference "living rooms." Each room is furnished with contemporary sofas, corner tables, huge lamps, coffee tables and occasional chairs.

The color scheme was planned to feature muted colors of bronze, gold, copper, mustard and rust. Wood pieces are of oil walnut that are complemented by well placed plants.

The trust team of Theodoroff, Park and Wilson was first established in Birmingham last March to serve the expanding trust requirements of Birmingham-Bloomfield and Oakland County residents.
