**Board Adopts Non-Residents Library Policy**

A study of resident and non-resident use of the Baldwin Public Library made in 1959-60 shows that non-residents were responsible for over 40 per cent of the Library's use, yet contributed through non-resident fees only 13 per cent of its operating expense.

By 1970, population estimates indicate a 62 per cent increase for the area surrounding Birmingham but an increase of only 10 per cent for the City of Birmingham. Thus, the inequity of cost to Birmingham taxpayers will become more pronounced if the present situation continues.

The primary purpose of Baldwin Public Library is to provide the best possible library service to residents of Birmingham. Both this objective and the interests of Birmingham as a community are furthered by permitting non-resident use of the library, providing such non-resident use is paid for on a fair and equitable basis.

THEFORE, THE BOARD deems it to be in the best interest of the people of Birmingham to adopt the following policy on non-resident use of the Library:

1. To offer each neighboring community the opportunity to provide library service for all of its residents by entering into a contractual agreement with the Baldwin Public Library with payment on a fair basis.

2. To discontinue the present fee arrangement of providing non-resident service by July 1, 1964. In the
