Chase Baromeo, 625 Watkins, Birmingham, internationally acclaimed basso, joined the faculty of the Detroit Institute of Musical Art. After an enviable career in opera, Mr. Baromeo became head of the voice department of the University of Texas, and for the past eight years held the same position with the University of Michigan. He has performed at important opera houses and with major symphonic groups on the continent and in the western hemisphere.

HE WAS chosen by Arturo Toscanini for contact with the distinguished LaScala Opera Company in Italy and was with that celebrated organization for four years. Mr. Baromeo is well known for his superb performance with the Chicago Civic Opera Company and the Metropolitan Opera Company of New York City. In addition he made appearances as soloist with the Chicago, Cincinnati, St. Louis, Detroit, New York Philharmonic, Cleveland and Kansas City Orchestras.

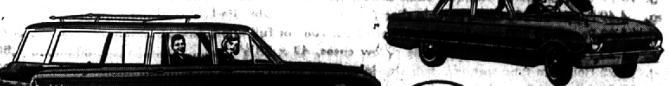
