parts of Antrim, Otsego, Crawford, Roscommon, Missaukee, and Kalamazoo counties.

The season is timed with the first week of pheasant hunting to tone down gun pressure. Its daily starting time is 10 a.m., another measure aimed at protecting the birds from overhunting.

ARCHERS WILL take to the woods under the same regulations as last year. They may hunt for bear Sunday, Nov. 5, minus the aid of dogs. Deer of either sex or any age will be legal for bowmen throughout most of the state during the same period.

In Emmet, Chippewa (not including Drummond Island), and Menominee counties, archers must limit their kill to bucks with antlers at least three inches long. They will again have a Oct. 1-Dec. 15 any-deer season in Allegan county.

As in 1960, bear hunters may hunt with dogs from Sunday through Nov. 5 in the upper peninsula and through Oct. 15 in the northern lower peninsula. A short Oct. 13-15 bear season is on tap in the southern lower peninsula.

In answer to the Conservation Department's large, growing number of requests for "any-deer" permit applications, Michigan hunters are reminded there will be no state-wide antlerless deer hunting season this fall.

Only 250 permits will be issued for antlerless deer hunting during the state's regular Nov. 15-30 firearm season. Of these, 140 will apply to a 14-square-mile area in Oceana county while the remaining 90 will be issued for a nine-square-mile sector in Mason county. Both are areas where landowners requested special seasons to help control deer which are damaging fruit orchards.

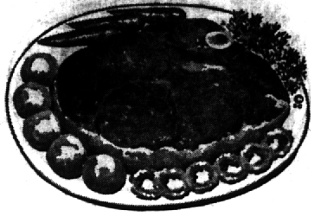

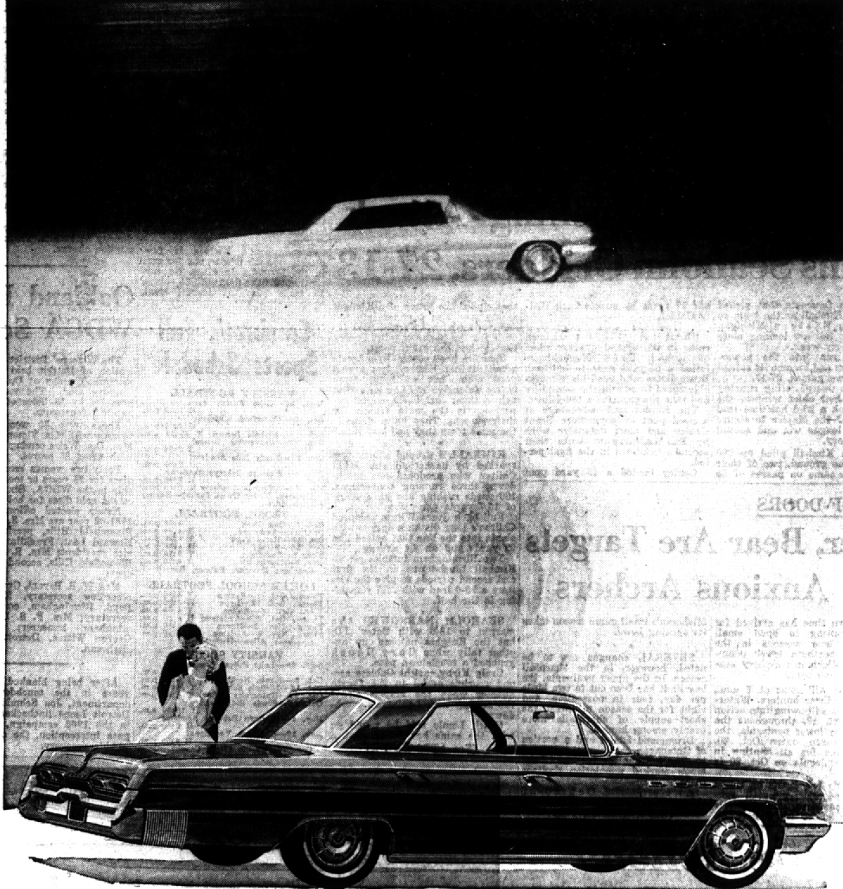
