"FOR THIS demonstration Moss will be given his choice of several of the finest racing machines in the area," he said.

Moss is noted for his thrilling duels with American Phil Hill of California, who is currently leading the endurance of race car competitors.

Birmingham's Nielson is favored to win the trophy for cars in the Formula Jr. class. He currently leads the field with 35 points, 13 more than his nearest rival.

Chuck Dietrich of Sandusky, Ohio, NIELSON'S Formula Jr. is a sleek Lotus XX, one of the most popular new cars competing at the club this year.

Baldwin will be driving a Lotus XVII, Nieman an Alpha Guilletta, and Ryburn a Saab GT.

The Fall Classics will feature two annual trophy races besides the awarding of the new honor.

The first trophy will be presented to the winner of the feature production car race which will pit Conover's Morgans, a Austin-Healey and other top production cars against each other.

Second trophy will go to the winner of the feature modified car race.

There were 70 women in the tournament with Mrs. Victor Ryden and Mrs. Don Weiss coming out on top with gross 80 scores for the day.

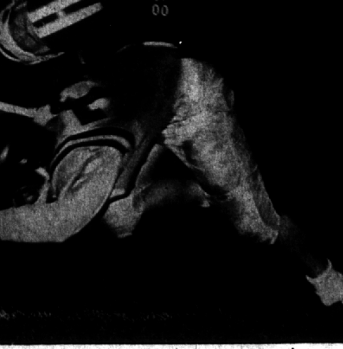
Forty-two women received silver discs for 25 years or more membership in the WDGA. Six women received gold discs for holes-in-one.
