Expand Secondary Summer School In Grades 7-12

Credit courses will be offered in mathematics, English, journalism, foreign languages, science, social studies, art, and commercial. Driver training and a number of other non-credit courses will also be offered.

Newton Property Hearing Reset

A public hearing on a rezoning request for the so-called Newton property on Woodward near Colonial Court has been reset for April 30.

City commissioners approved the new date Monday night after an error in advertising prevented the hearing from being held on the originally scheduled date of April 26.

A four-story, 85-unit apartment building valued at \$2,000,000 is proposed for this site.

The property would have to be rezoned from R-5 multiple family to R-7 to make the four-story building possible. The city planning board recommended the rezoning at its March 27 meeting.
