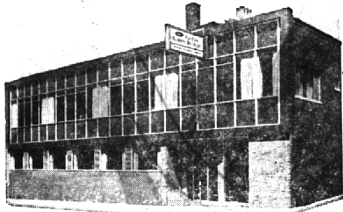

# Postpone Resolution on Airport

A request for Birmingham to take a stand on the proposed Oakland County jet airport failed to materialize at Monday night's city commission meeting.

Commissioner William H. Barzum had a resolution prepared but decided to wait until next week to submit it when the full commission would be in attendance and when the city's representatives to the board of supervisors would be named.

Barzum intends to ask the commission to oppose the contemplated international airport.

Commissioners postponed the appointment of supervisors until next week's meeting because Commissioner Charles Renfrew, who was in St. Louis on business, was unable to attend this week's session.

THE BIRMINGHAM Eccentric has in the past criticized in editorial and editorialized the method of routinely reappointing the supervisors every year.

criticized the board of supervisors for acting on behalf of land for the proposed airport within 10 days after the plan was announced to the public.

Birmingham supervisor David Levinson is chairman of the supervisors' Ways and Means Committee. He has been an influential figure in county affairs. He has been a supervisor 29 years.

Commissioner and supervisor Carl F. Ingraham, who told the city commission he favored the airport proposal—serves on the supervisors' Legislative Committee. He has been a supervisor four years.

A SUPERVISOR 14 years, Mrs. Hope E. Lewis is chairman of the Welfare Committee.

Luther C. Heacock, a supervisor 17 years, is chairman of the Building and Grounds Committee.

At the meeting Tuesday, the board of supervisors voted to ask for a detailed estimate of costs for the airport. The resolution was offered by John Lestler, supervisor of Orion Township, where most of the airfield would be situated.

The board referred to the Aviation

Committee another Lestler resolution, to delay any further spending on the airport until the cost estimate is completed, within five months.

TROY MAYOR Robert Huber suggested that the Airport Committee include in its report the possibilities of usage by major airlines.

Avon Township Supervisor Cyril Miller charged that the Ways and Means Committee had deleted \$100,000 in the proposed budget for repair and replacement of road bridges in townships.

This money had been "promised," Miller claimed.

Miller claimed that plans called for diversion of the money for airport planning and improvements on the 415 acres recently purchased by the county in its first step to acquire land for the jet field.

CHARGING THAT Miller was "misleading," Levinson said that "no promise had been made in the 'bridge appropriation'."

Levinson said there was a proposal in the new budget to raise

funds for bridge work by an extra levy of 1-20th of a mill.

Last week, State Atty. Gen. Frank J. Kelley ruled that the supervisors are authorized to establish the airport without a vote of the electors.

Kelley said the board may without voter approval acquire property for the site and use funds for airport purposes which are not already earmarked or appropriated for other uses.

## Problems

TRUSTEES on a township board have been called "the watchdogs of township money" as they must approve the yearly budget as well as all expenditures of township funds.

As members of the township board, they meet twice a month, on the second and fourth Mondays of the month. Their pay is an honorarium of \$15 a meeting.

In addition they attend public hearings in conjunction with the setting up of special assessment districts in the township. They must pass on all recommendations made by the township planning commission, relating to zoning and land development.

All issuance of liquor licenses must have their approval. A sub-committee of the township screens applicants for liquor licenses and makes recommendations to the board.

ANOTHER BOARD subcommittee makes a study of road improvement.

Present trustees of the township are Robert Reid, Henry Hogan Jr., Sam Reeve and Frank Swindell. Reid and Hogan's terms expire in 1963. Reeve and Swindell's in 1965. Swindell was appointed this year to serve the unexpired term of Gordon Getzinger.

Other elective offices in the township are two justices of the peace, two constables and a highway commissioner.

Justices are Albert Carr and Alice L. Gilbert. They serve four-year terms and are paid on a fee basis. Justice Carr's term expires in 1963. Justice Gilbert's in '65.

Highway commissioner, a \$1 a year job, is Fred Chapman.

CONSTABLES are Karl E. Rhoads and Maurice S. Morry. Their terms are for two years. They are paid on a fee basis for services rendered primarily as process and subpoena service.

Township Assessor, William E. Maloney is an appointive official. He values township property for taxation purposes.

Assessments may be protested to the township board of review. Members of this board are the township supervisor and two appointive officials, Jamie Martin and Stephen Tompkins. The board hears protests once a year, in March.

OTHER Bloomfield Township governmental departments are the police, fire and sewer and water departments.

Under Police Chief Norman Dehake, the township 14 policemen—one lieutenant, three sergeants and 11 patrolmen, plus one police dog. Eight volunteers supplement the force on weekends. The four patrol cars cover some 25,000 miles a month in patrolling the township.

The township operates three fire stations, with a fourth to be added this year. Chief Vally Yanzoski heads a 15-man fire force. This is supplemented by 38 volunteer firemen.

THE WATER and sewer department is headed by Jim Scott. It is self-sustaining, with sewer and water charges meeting expenses of the department.

At present one-half of township homes have central water systems from the 40 wells owned by the township. Sewage laterals connected to the Evergreen Interceptor are being gradually developed in the township.

The township's seven man planning commission plays an important role in a community where only a half of the land is developed.

All zoning problems are presented to the board, all subdivision plats must receive its approval. Final approval reverts to the township board.

Members of the commission are chairman Ed Proctor, Andrew Wiley, Robert C. Boger, Howard Stewart, Frederick A. Stewart, Albert A. Reid.

Members are appointed by the board and confirmed by the township board.
