Fisher has been president of the Jewish Welfare Federation in Detroit for the past four years. In 1957, as campaign chairman for their fund drive, he achieved the highest goal in the history of the community. He also serves as a national chairman of the United Jewish Appeal.

FISHER IS vice president and director of Sinai Hospital of Detroit and vice president of the Greater Detroit Hospital Council.

He is a member of the board of directors of Hebrew Union College. A native of Pittsburgh, he was graduated from Ohio State University in 1930.
