there," says the dean, "we have had about three congregations...

AS THE DEAN of the Inner City church, Weaver has directed his efforts toward a revival of that portion of the Motor City.

He was first chairman of the Urban Renewal Commission of the diocese. He applied his sociological know-how to a study of the Inner City which was published and distributed throughout Episcopaldom.

"Twenty per cent of the people in the Inner City are hostile," he tells you with concern. "Many live alone. They have no friends. They go to no church."

"Almost 75 per cent of the jobless people between 16 and 21 live in the Inner City. Many of them are just up from the swamps. In the United States, 30 million people move a year. Most of them move into an Inner City port of entry. They keep pushing out as they progress."

But suburbanites cannot turn their backs on the city, emphasizes the dean.

"I BELIEVE that we are all one family and that we are dependent one on the other. We have to have a new concept. The city is sort of a 'watering hole' for all the people who work there and live in the suburbs."

"Now the city has taken a terrible beating. But what happens to the people in the Inner City affects all of us."

The dean doesn't just talk. He acts. He recently sent \$200 as a gift to the City of Detroit, an "earnest money... for the betterment of our beloved community."

He commutes to his work for the

Inner City every morning but Friday and Saturday. He spends those days in the study at home, writing his sermons.

OFTEN AS HE writes, children play on the lawn outside with his Margaret, 12; Eliza Jane, 10; Jean, 6; and Linda, 1.

On Sunday mornings his four daughters are in their Sunday best by 7:30 a.m. and ready to accompany him and his attractive wife, Mrs. Weaver, to the Inner City. They don't arrive back until about 2:30 p.m. Sometimes they take sandwiches, then lunch on them when coffee hour is over at about 1 p.m. Often they go out to lunch with some special visitor who has attended church that day.

LIVING 21 miles from the cathedral isn't the easiest way, Dean Weaver admits.

But when they lived in Detroit until two years ago, his daughters needed young companions.

"Each of the girls had one friend to play with," said Dean Weaver.

He mentioned to the big lawn outside his picture window and added, "Out here, there are children by the dozens."

Though he moved to the suburbs for his family's benefit, the handsome dean found that he enjoys that universal suburban hobby, The Garden.

"I didn't realize I would, but when I got out here, I liked it."

IN FACT, he admits, he likes the suburbs so well that he probably wouldn't drive his family to the Inner City on Sundays, "if I didn't work there. Not when St. Stephen's Episcopal Church is so near us."

Has he ever been tempted to leave the Inner City and its troubles and move to a suburban church?

"Many times," he admits, "but my wife and I feel that we have been called to serve the Inner City, and so we continue on."

LATHRUP—A fire in an empty house, owned by Mrs. Louise Lathrup Kelley, is believed to have been set "by a person or persons unknown," according to Southfield Fire Capt. Henry Denoyers.

Damage has not yet been estimated in the fire, which broke out the evening of April 9, Denoyers said the building was insured for \$10,000.

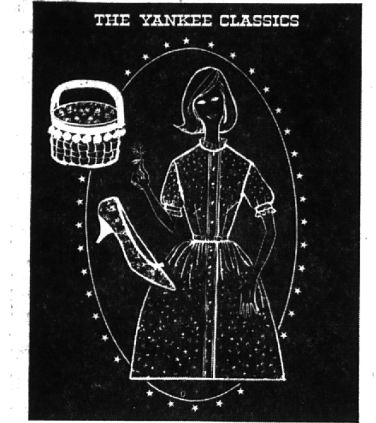

TULIP BEDS:—Fertilizing now will not produce better flowers this spring. But, it is the only way to produce big healthy bulbs for spring of '63. Use GARD-N-GROW (4-12-4) or AGRICO FOR GARDENS (6-10-5)

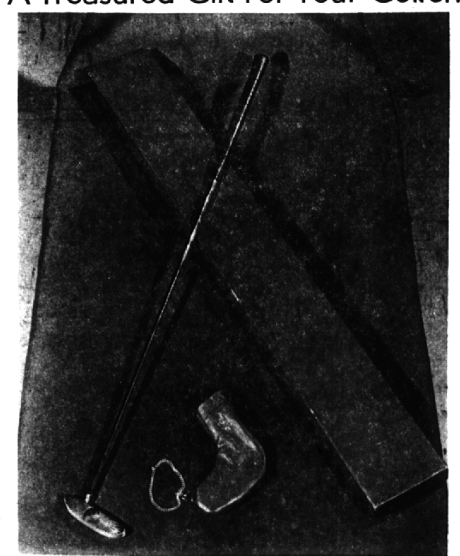
