Maudy Thursday is being observed today at St. Stephen's Episcopal Church with a prayer vigil in the church, beginning at 9:30 a.m.

Special prayers will be offered for church unity and world peace. The prayer vigil will terminate in the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper at 7:30 p.m.

An Anti-Communism service at 6:30 a.m. will open the observance of Good Friday. The traditional Tre Ore will be held from noon until 3 p.m. and Stations of the Cross will be made in the evening at 7.

On Saturday, Anti-Communism will again be held at 6:30 a.m., an Easter Even Holy Baptism will take place at 4 p.m. The Sacrament of Forgiveness will be made available at the church from 8 until 9 p.m.

Three celebrations of the Holy Eucharist will mark Easter Sunday. Those Holy Communion services will be in the morning at 6:30, at 8 and at 10.

Following Easter there will be 7:30 p.m. services of Holy Communion on Easter Monday and on Easter Tuesday.

Rev. Carl R. Sayers, vicar of St. Stephen's, will be the celebrant for all services.

Rev. Kenneth H. Gass, D.D., Rector, will preach on "Seven Last Words" at the Good Friday services held from noon to 3 p.m. at St. James Episcopal Church.

A children's service and movie in the Chapel of the Holy Spirit under the direction of the Rev. David Van Dusen will be held from 1:30 to 3 p.m. Good Friday.

Four services highlight the Easter morning services. A Holy Communion service will be held at 6 a.m.

Osberger Named Financial Chairman

State Police Caution Bike Riders

With increased bicycling in the warm weather months, bike riders, parents and motorists are urged by the State Police to exert extra efforts in reducing the danger in this activity which claimed 29 lives and injured 1,847 in 2,302 accidents in Michigan last year.

The deaths were the second highest in the nine-year period 1953-1961 while the totals of injured and accidents were the second highest ever reported in the state.

Nineteen were killed and 410 injured in rural car-bike accidents while such mishaps in urban areas claimed 10 lives and injured 1,457.

Eighty-three per cent, or more than eight out of 10, of the bicyclists killed were under 19 years of age.

According to studies, the principal contributing causes of bicycle accidents, which also were violations of law, include:

- Entering the roadway from a private driveway without stopping; suddenly stopping, starting, or veering from course of travel without adequate warning to other traffic; disregarding stop signs and signals; riding at night without proper lighting on the bicycle, and riding double on a one-seated bicycle or stunting.

The State Police emphasize that all bicyclists must obey the traffic laws and signs and parents should restrict bicycle use when children violate the law or safe practices.

Maps, Signs Make Driving Easy on Michigan Highways

Hardly anyone gets lost traveling in Michigan anymore.

Nearly 400,000 signs on state highways make it possible to drive almost anywhere in the state without a wrong turn.

And in the glove compartment of nearly every car is that silent helper, the road map.

Together, the maps and highway signs make the job of finding your way in Michigan pretty simple.

BUT IS WASN'T always this easy.

In the early 1900's, when the horse and buggy and a new contraption called the automobile were sharing Michigan's roads, maps and highway signs were a novelty.

Motorists traveled at their own risk of becoming lost.

Early map makers guided travelers by means of church spires, clumps of trees and an occasional homemade mile post.

SOME ENTERPRISING MAP makers put up their own route markers, but motorists had to buy one of the company's maps to figure out what the signs meant.

It got to the point where there were as many as 15 different signs running up one telephone pole.

A confused motorist would have to stop, get out his map and see if any of the signs on the pole looked like the ones on his map.

Back seat drivers must have been a real nuisance then.

BUT MOTORISTS GOT a break in 1916 when one map company announced a contest with a \$100 prize

for the employe who came up with the best idea for a new map.

A bright young map draftsman suggested road maps for motorists. He also suggested that each road be identified by a distinguishing symbol.

The road maps caught on fast, but it wasn't until 1925 that a uniform numbering system was adopted by the American Association of State Highway Officials.

Today, about 200 million highway maps are printed each year by oil companies and millions more are given away by state highway departments and other agencies. It's an \$11 million annual business.

B'ham Rejects Drain Project

Birmingham city commissioners have rejected a petition from Madison Heights to participate in enclosure of the Red Run Drain from east of Stephenson to John R.

Assistant City Manager R. S. Kenning pointed out that Birmingham is already participating with other area communities in three construction projects which are designed to alleviate some of the conditions objectionable to Madison Heights.

The cost to Birmingham in these three projects amounts to about \$2,000,000.

Michigan's highways are numbered in orderly fashion for the convenience of motorists.

Even numbered Interstate and U.S. highways run generally east and west, odd numbered highways run generally north and south, a system in effect throughout the country.

THUS, US-2 RUNS east and west across the Upper Peninsula; Interstate 94 runs east and west across the southern part of the Lower Peninsula.

US-23 runs north and south along the east coast of the Lower Peninsula; US-31 follows the Michigan shoreline.

Michigan's official map and highway signs are time tested, but State Highway Department employes are constantly experimenting with new methods to direct travelers.

Someday soon, someone will come up with another prize winning suggestion—like the one in 1916 that put a road map in the glove compartment of nearly every car on the road.

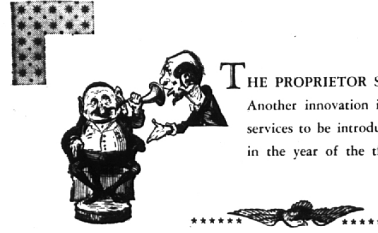
