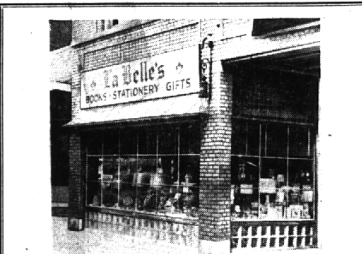

leader of troop 34. Current leaders of troop 34 are Mrs. George Fabyan, Mrs. John May and Mrs. Chris T. Reinhardt.

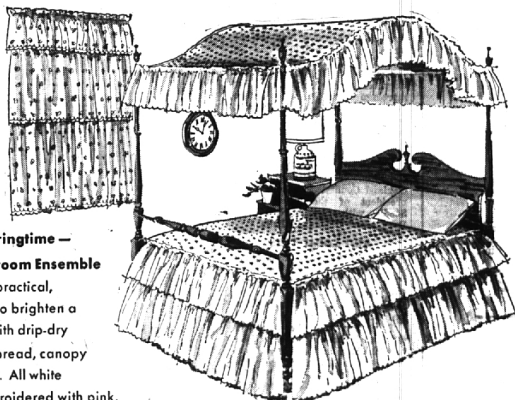
