Mr. and Mrs. William Hartmann celebrated their eleventh anniversary by flying down to Dayton to spend the week end with friends.

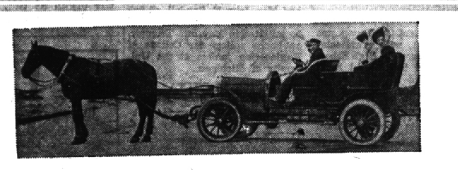

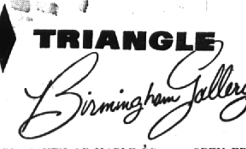
