

B'ham LWV Undertakes Library Service Study

The Birmingham League of Women Voters will undertake a study of library service for the Birmingham area as its local program item during the coming year.

The study was voted by more than 100 members who attended the League's annual meeting and luncheon held at Devon Gables last Friday.

In 1964, the Baldwin Library is discontinuing non-resident service on an individual fee basis.

The League proposed: "A study with a view to action measures intended to provide adequate library service in the Birmingham area. The subject is timely because if residents of Bloomfield Township, the cities of Bloomfield Hills and Troy and the

villages of Franklin and Bingham Farms are to have adequate library service after the July, 1964 deadline, they must make some provision for it, either by expanding their library facilities, by contracting with Baldwin or other established libraries, or by some other means. The Village of Beverly Hills now has a contract with the Baldwin Library."

All Michigan Leagues will continue to work for a better Michigan constitution and for solutions to metropolitan area problems during the coming year. The national level program will be chosen at a convention later in April.

Paperback Book Boom Hits SHS

Paperback book boom hits Southfield High!

The 35-cent paperback book sales at the Student Council "Book Nook" should total more than 3,000 copies this year, according to the faculty sponsor of the project, Mr. David Moscow. "We've already sold 2,400 copies, and we should easily sell about 3,200 by June," said Moscow.

PROFITS go to the Student Council scholarship fund, from which a \$200 award was given last June.

"We try to offer a wide range of titles," said Moscow, "so that every student can find something interesting to read. We have 'The Iliad,' 'Hot Rod,' 'Crossword Puzzles,' 'The Bible,' and 'Stories from the Twilight Zone'."

Books sold are recommended by students and faculty, and reviewed by a board of teachers for approval. Sales are made during lunch hours by students who get a book a month for their sales efforts.

Effect of the sales has been to interest all students in reading, and to create a widespread interest in good books.

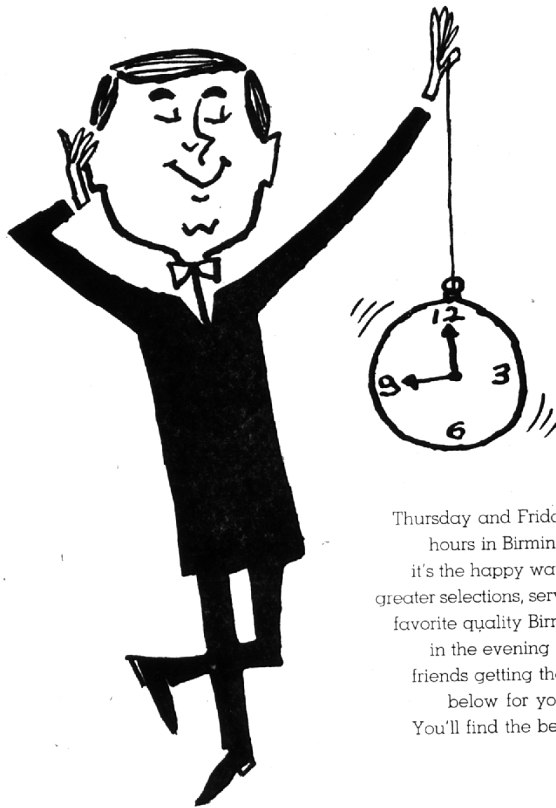
The winning entry from each county will be judged in state-wide competition to determine the grand prize winners.
