Prior to moving to Ann Arbor three years ago, Mr. Bowers had been art director for D. P. Brother & Company and Ross Roy, Inc., Detroit advertising agencies; and for the Gray-Garfield-Lange art studios. He taught design for several years at the Monogram Art School of Detroit. During his business years, he lived at Green Lake and in Birmingham.

**Mrs. Cecil Billington**  
Memorial services for Mrs. Nina Allen Billington, widow of Cecil Billington, were held in Tecumseh, Mich., and at the graveside in neighboring Tipton Cemetery, Monday afternoon. She died July 27 in Evanston, Ill., where she had resided with the family of her son, Ray Billington, professor of history at Northwestern University, since shortly after the death of her husband in 1950.

The Fair gives 4-H Club members, ages ten to twenty-one an opportunity to exhibit their 4-H projects or livestock and compete for blue ribbons and cash premiums. All exhibits are to be in place at 7 p.m. Tuesday and remain until 4 p.m. Saturday.

City commissioners Monday night deferred action for one week on a request to delete property at 312 E. Brown from the downtown sidewalk program.
