 Maj. Gen. Stanley E. Reinhart, 611 Madison Avenue, was one of seven Michigan residents who were adopted into the Ottawa tribe and given traditional Indian names in colorful ceremonies held Sunday night along the shores of Little Traverse Bay at Harbor Springs.
 The program climaxed a full program of tribal dancing and chanting by braves of the Ottawa and Sioux tribes. The Indian name given General Reinhart was Wagoshen, meaning "the fox."

An estimated 2711 students will be enrolled in the Birmingham schools this September, according to figures arrived at through the school census taken last May 31. This figure, however, does not include those students enrolled in the Walnut Lake School which became a part of the Birmingham school district July 1. According to the May figures, there were 2675 students enrolled. Dr. John H. Springman, assistant superintendent of schools, estimates that there will be around 220 kindergarten students registering this September.
