With flowery climax, delegates from Honolulu extended their invitation with orchid leis to everyone to come to Waikiki in '63, where the next convention will be held.

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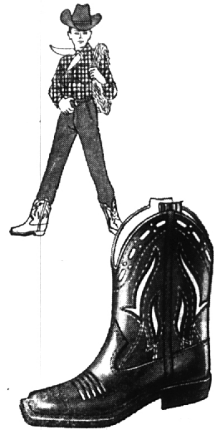
