**Michigan's Fort Mackinac Observes 1812 Anniversary**

Mackinac Island, sacred refuge of the Indians and guardian of the Straits of Mackinac, this summer is celebrating the 150th anniversary of the War of 1812. In that year the British captured Fort Mackinac in a surprise attack on the American garrison.

Fort Mackinac, standing watch atop the limestone cliffs of the Island and Fort Mackinac guarded the Straits through which the great fur fleets had to pass.

Built by the British in 1780-81 after they had abandoned Fort Michilimackinac at present day Mackinaw City, Fort Mackinac was turned over to American forces in 1796, only to be recaptured by the British in the War of 1812. It was turned back to the Americans in 1815 and remained an active army post until 1861. Finally the Federal government relinquished the fort and the island to Michigan and the state turned a major portion of the island into a state park development.

**THE FORT MUSEUM,** located in the soldiers' barracks, depicts the original garrison life through period settings complete with mannequins. Another structure houses a scene of fort life in the 1880's dramatized with animated mannequins. Fort Mackinac's tearoom in

Agency. One of her first duties is to interview General Claire Chennault (American, Protestant), almost legendary leader of the Flying Tigers. This begins Friday, then marriage in 1947 when she is 24 and he is 34.

They are very much in love, but unhappily Chennault is stricken with cancer in 1956 and dies of it in 1958.

Why then does this book strike me as being limp, artificially unsatisfactory, and lacking in good taste? One of the reasons is the purple writing. Here is a brief sampling: "His dark eyes were radiant, intense. Some of his vast store of courage seemed to flow into me from his eyes and his strong hands holding mine so firmly."

It is all too shallow. Love as an overwhelming emotion is cheapened in the writing, which flows along like treacly syrup.

**FURTHERMORE,** the book is full of tears, even long before his death. "There must have been a hint of tears in my voice" and "There was a lump in my throat and tears stung my eyes." I don't think the author realized what she was revealing in one passage towards the end when General Chennault himself finally asks her, "if you'll promise me one thing: 'What? No tears!'"

**WHAT CONTRIBUTES** most to poor taste, and my objections here are more serious than my dislike for "cloying" clichés is the unpleasant tinge of exhibitionism, an unsavoriness inherent with memoirs but nevertheless one that can be avoided.

Mr. Chennault includes, in full, letters that the Chennaults wrote each other when he was ill—private letters full of private feelings.

I wringed in embarrassment. I do not suggest that there is anything carnal in them, because there most certainly is not.

**THERE ARE** some good things to be said about the book. These include personal glimpses of China at war, vivid vignettes of a convent in Hong Kong during the Japanese occupation and of refugees on the road.

My own favorite incident centers on the obstacles Chennault had to overcome before he could marry Anna.

He had to wage a campaign to obtain her grandparents' consent (tress for her grandmother and bride came with her grandfather, an inveterate overbidder), her parents' consent, and finally the generalissimo and Madame Chiang's consent.

"When he came back from Nanking, with the First Couple's approval and blessing, he said to me: 'I'll never propose to another Chinese girl—it's too much trouble!'"

**THE STRUCTURE** of the book is interesting, smoothly combining personal history in chronology and flashback, with digressions on the political and military situation.

I think the author gives an essentially accurate picture of the war and the factions involved and the aftermath, including the Communist problem.

While I was reading "A Thousand Springs," I confess to having been swept along by its facile sentimentality. It is perfectly possible to enjoy this book if the approach is an unthinking and uncritical one.

However, once you begin to think about it, I'm afraid you too will arrive at the conclusion that this is a "weakly lost" biography of a marriage.
