'Where's Our Pay' County Jurors Say

The \$57,500 budgeted for jury duty pay this year in Oakland County has been used up and jurors may miss their \$8-a-day stipend as a result.

This is what the Ways and Means Committee of the County Board of Supervisors was told Monday afternoon. The budget has been used up in the first six months of the year and two more terms, in September and November, remain on the schedule.

The lack of funds was caused by a change in procedure in calling jurors in the county and by unusual circumstances during the June term of Oakland County Circuit Court.

THESE COMBINED to put the cost of jurors for the term at nearly \$40,000. The two previous terms this year cost \$8,500 apiece. The cost of a 12-month operation in 1960 was \$41,000.

Aware of mounting complaints from attorneys over the caliber and makeup of county juries, Oakland County Circuit Judges decided to call more jurors during the June term and have them in Pontiac one day earlier.

THE CHANGE forced Daniel T. Murphy, county clerk, to call 200 jurors in June. Murphy said Tuesday that if his office must continue to call more jurors it too will need more money to operate.

As yet county officials don't know how much more money is needed or where it is coming from.

Commission Votes Against Jet Airport

Birmingham city commissioners Monday night officially passed a resolution against a proposed Oakland County jet airport.

Moving on the resolution that was tabled April 15, the commissioners voted unanimously to notify the board of supervisors that Birmingham was against any new major airport.

One commissioner termed the move as "putting another nail in the coffin."

Reports have been circulating throughout the county for several weeks that the board of supervisors would abandon the idea of building an airport.

A member of the supervisor's aviation committee expressed the possibility of dropping the project after the commercial carriers announced they were "not interested" in a second major airport in the metropolitan area.

The airlines letter was the second major blow to the county's plan. In June, the Federal Aviation Agency told the county that the plan was "unacceptable."

The FAA had listed lack of airspace and conflict of flight patterns as reasons for turning down the proposal.

In taking Monday's action, Birmingham's Mayor Florence Willett said she thought it would be "timely" for the city to take an official position on the matter.

The board of supervisors aviation committee will meet Friday with Pontiac city officials to explore the possibility of expanding Pontiac Municipal Airport.

Birmingham Revises Dance Hall Ordinance

Tentative approval of a new dance hall ordinance was given by the Birmingham City Commission Monday night.

The revised ordinance will be included in the codification of city laws and become effective when the codification is adopted.

Also tentatively approved was a proposed amendment to the Fire Prevention Ordinance requiring notice to the Fire Prevention Bureau of assemblies, meetings, dances, classes or gatherings of 50 or more persons in any building.

A POINT of the fire ordinance covering assemblies in school buildings carried on by school authorities is still to be cleared up by city and school officials.

Until the codification is approved the city will continue to operate under its old dance ordinance.

The new ordinance will require inspection of public dance halls and

schools and will cover licenses, fees and insurance.

The city manager rather than the commission will have the authority to approve dance applications under the new ordinance.

Exempted from the ordinance are the Birmingham Public Schools, parochial schools, the Birmingham Community House, the YMCA and any other municipal or charitable organization which may be named by resolution of the commission.

Drains Belong To City Now

The Oakland County Drain Commission has officially notified the Birmingham City Commission that it has transferred jurisdiction of the Humphrey, Adams, Lincoln Avenue and Gordon drains to the City.

The City will now accept the jurisdiction and responsibility for maintenance, control and operation of the drain projects and relative drainage districts.

The drains involved in the transfer are all wholly within the city of Birmingham. The county will transfer \$893.81 credited to the transferred drains to the city for use.
