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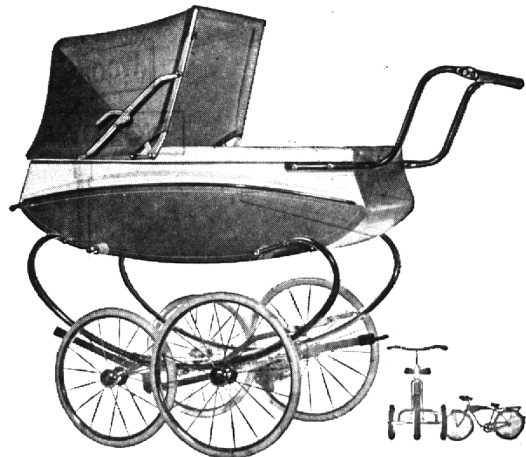


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Birmingham Area JA's To Have New Quarters

Junior Achievement, the organization which puts teenagers in business during the school year, is expanding its operations in the north Detroit suburbs with the erection of a modern concrete, brick and glass structure in the Birmingham-Royal Oak area.

The building—fifth in a series of Junior Achievement facilities to be constructed in southeastern Michigan since 1958—will be located on North Woodward at 13 1/2 Mile Road. It will serve as base of operations for teenagers from Birmingham, Royal Oak, Farmington, Berkley, Clawson, Madison Heights, Hazel Park, Oak Park and Huntington Woods.

Announcement of JA's current building expansion program was made by Junior Achievement President southeast Michigan Ben D. Mills, Ford vice president and general manager of the Lincoln-Mercury division. Mills resides at 101 Vaughn Road, Bloomfield Hills.

THE MULTI-LEVEL building will feature 8,500 square feet of working space and will have four company rooms, JA banking facilities, a modern work shop area for JA companies as well as 1,000-1,500 teenagers and up to 65 JA companies a week.

The new facilities will replace the Junior Achievement staff personnel. Mills said the new North Woodward Business Center will be able to accommodate between 1,000-1,500 teenagers and up to 65 JA companies a week.

Birmingham and Royal Oak The Birmingham center, which was located at 177 S. Woodward, first opened in 1953 and handled eight JA companies and approximately 120 Achievers from Birmingham and Bloomfield Hills each year.

The former Royal Oak center, which opened in 1955, was located at 1405 S. Main St. Last year it accommodated 25 junior-size companies and 500 Achievers.

Mills said that expansion of JA facilities in the Birmingham-Royal Oak area from a statistical standpoint was highly desirable (more than 600 teenagers applied for JA membership in Birmingham last year and afforded the communities involved an opportunity to offer basic economic education to hundreds of additional high school juniors and seniors who heretofore were unable to join JA because of inadequate facilities.

JUNIOR Achievement operations in southeastern Michigan rank first in the nation and with the realignment of facilities in the north Detroit suburbs the organization will have fifteen business centers throughout the area.

The new North Woodward building is scheduled for occupancy when the '62-'63 program year gets underway Oct. 8. Formal dedication ceremonies and an open house are planned for the first week of October. Architects for the building were Tarapata-MacMahon Associates, Inc. of Bloomfield Hills. The general contractor is Webster Builders, Inc. of Royal Oak.

WSU Breaks Ground on 2 Buildings

The start of the first new construction on the Wayne State University campus in more than three years began last Wednesday, with groundbreaking for the \$2,325,000 classroom building—Helen DeRoy Hall.

Designed by Minoru Yamasaki and Associates, the development consists of the classroom building and the Helen DeRoy Hall, a lecture facility.

The buildings will be located on the Cass Avenue end of the present mall between the University General Library and State Hall.

The classroom building, fronting on Cass, will be a three structure with a unique first floor "arcade" giving students an open access route to the Helen DeRoy Hall.

LOCATED DIRECTLY west of the classroom building, DeRoy Hall will rise in a courtyard setting of trees and a reflecting pool.

It will contain lecture rooms, primarily for instructional purposes, seating a total of 700 students.

Helen DeRoy Hall was made possible by a grant of \$23,000 from the Helen L. DeRoy Foundation in honor of Mrs. DeRoy, a long-time resident of Detroit.

The classroom building, in addition to providing classroom space, will also house facilities for the staff of the School of Business Administration. Construction, by the firm of Darin and Armstrong, is expected to be completed in the fall of 1963.

THREE OTHER buildings are also slated for early groundbreaking. The Helen Newberry Joy Residence for Women and a Medical Research Center are expected to be started before fall, while construction for Shapiro Hall for the College of Pharmacy will begin this winter.

Shapiro Hall, to be located on Palmer between Cass and Second, will be equipped with instructional and research facilities for the College of Pharmacy. The Medical

Research Building, to be located in an area bounded by Canfield, Beauharnais, St. Antoine and Willis, is part of the Medical Center Urban Renewal Project.

The Helen Newberry Joy Residence for Women will be built on Kirby between Second and Third. Designed to accommodate 258 women students, it represents the first major step to solve the critical problem of student housing at the University.

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
