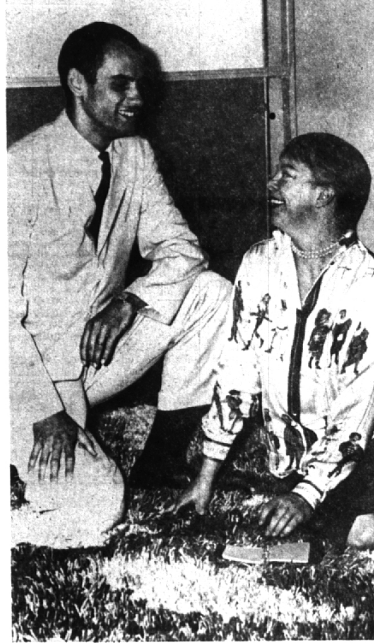


Broadway on Tour—Locally

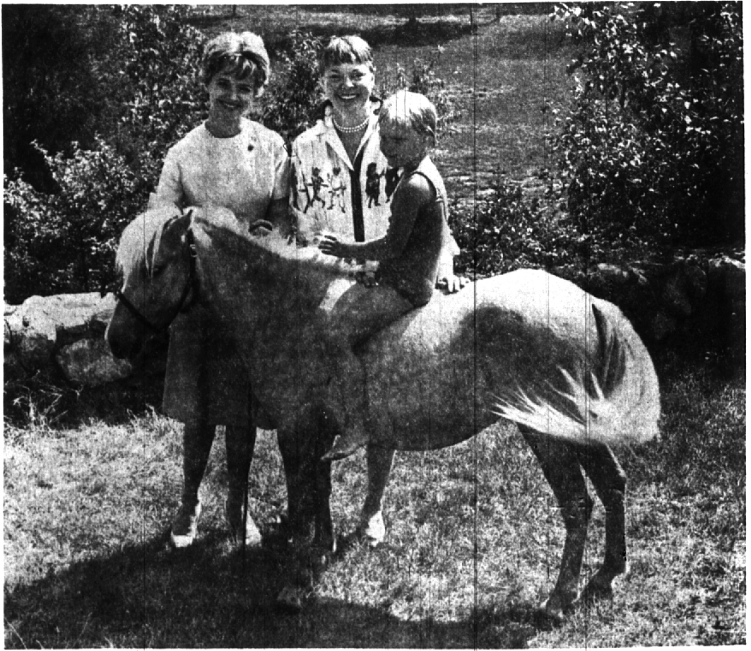
