## Lions Expect Watkins' Presence To Improve Showing of Lewis

Coach George Wilson, currently putting his Detroit Lions through final practice sessions at Cranbrook School in preparation for Saturday night's season-opening exhibition game against the Cleveland Browns, is on the way to having his half-back problems solved.

Reason: The running help promised by Tom Watkins, 6-0, 195-pound halfback acquired in a six-man trade with Cleveland last winter.

Wilson figures the trade will help the Lions in two ways, first, with the improved running provided by Watkins, and second, that the presence of Watkins will make a better ball player of veteran Dan Lewis.

"Watkins, despite the fact that he is a bit underweight after a tooth problem in service, has shown us that he is going to be a real exciting runner," offers Wilson. "Not a speed demon, Tom has plenty of running class and good moves."

"With a player of Watkins' caliber and Lewis, a 210-pounder with great speed, could realize the full potential that has been his since he came into the league in 1958."

WHILE LEWIS' record shows a creditable 44 rushing average for four years of NFL duty, based on 1219 yards gained on 275 tries,

still the former Wisconsin star of the campaign with a shoulder thrust which the Lions have been seeking.

Only once, against Los Angeles in 1960, has Lewis gone the distance for a long gain. On that occasion, Dan scampered 74 yards for a TD to enjoy his finest NFL day, a 124-yard effort.

Watkins was used sparingly by Cleveland in his rookie season, but has improved his play sufficiently sharing work with Bobby Mitchell, to beat back the threat of the He averaged 49 yards per try on 43 attempts for 209 yards. However, either way, the Lions should over, he was selected for a part profit from the deal.

### Gridiron Mouth Guard Exhibit at State Fair

The dental display at the Michigan State Fair this year will feature the actual fabrication of mouth guards for football players and other athletes.

Such mouth guards are compulsory this year for Michigan high school football players.

The state fair display, sponsored by the Detroit District Dental Society in cooperation with the Michigan State Dental Assn., also will include a modern dental office and modern dental laboratory.

The dental exhibit will be on display through the State Fair's run, Aug. 24 through Sept. 3.

THE MOUTH guard section of the exhibit will be set up to show why such protective devices should be custom-made for the individual athlete and to demonstrate the ease with which they can be made by qualified personnel.

More than 300 Detroit area dentists are cooperating in providing mouth guards for area prep athletes this fall.

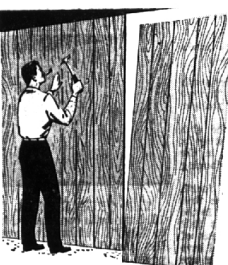
